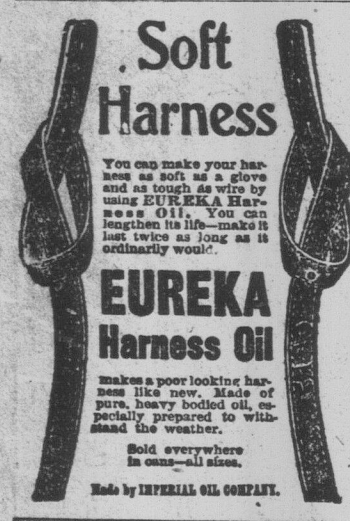




Publisher's Notice.

The America Cup defender, Reliance, has won two of the five races to be sailed for the trophy from Shamrock III. The first was a win by five feet and six minutes and the second by less than a minute over the 30 mile course. The third race is to be sailed today.

Labor Day Races at Chatham.

The directors of the Miramichi Agricultural Exhibition Association have decided upon a very attractive programme of races for Labor Day, Sept. 7th. There will be \$5000 purses, the events being a 220 yds. (for \$25), a 220 yds. (for \$40) (for \$175) and a 3 min. trot or pace for \$100. The conditions are mile heats, best three in five; entrance 5% of purse in each class, and 5% additional from money winners. National rules to govern where not otherwise provided for; trophies will be allowed on points; records taken after July 25 no bar. Entries close with Mr. Geo. E. Fisher, Chatham, on August 29th. The first race will be called at half past one on Labor Day.

Picnic and Sports at Nelson.

The Coronation Cup.

Acting Secretary, Robert Murray, Esq., of the Miramichi Yacht Club, has received the following:

SYDNEY, N. S., August 20th, 1903.

DEAR SIR:—Referring to my letter of June 30th, I beg to notify you, that unless a protest is received against this change of date, the first race for the Coronation Cup will be sailed on Saturday, September 5th, 10 a.m. instead of on Thursday, Sept. 3rd as originally advised you. The second race for the Cup will be sailed on Saturday, Sept. 5th, at 11:00 a.m., and if more races are necessary one will be held on each succeeding day at 1:00 p.m. until the contest is decided.

Entries will close on the evening of September 1st.

The races will be sailed under the rules of the Royal Kennebec Yacht Club. The time limit for each race will be six hours.

Sailing signals will be preparatory gun 10 minutes before the start, second gun 1 minute before the start and the third gun the signal to start.

Each club is privileged to enter any number of yachts for the races.

The races will be sailed in Sydney Harbor, over a course of about 14 nautical miles.

"Car" Kelly Wins.

Judge Darling in London, Eng., recently had before him the case of Bradshaw vs. Kelly. The defendant, J. Carling Kelly, is well known in Miramichi, and is a son of the late Hon. W. M. Kelly, of Chatham. The action was brought by Mr. J. A. Bradshaw, a Liverpool stockbroker, to recover a sum of money on a bill of exchange which was alleged the plaintiff had paid to pay.

Mr. Rufus Leves, counsel plaintiff, said the bill in question was dated February 26, 1903, and was discounted by the Royal Bank of Ireland, and plaintiff now sued the acceptor, who was the defendant. There was really no defence to the case, but a good deal had been alleged by Mr. Kelly against Mr. Ernest Tush Hooley, who has had transactions with Kelly respecting a coronation medal. According to Kelly, Mr. Hooley agreed to pay a commission of £1,000, and it was in respect to that that the bill on the whole thing was a fraud by Mr. Hooley, because he knew that the person who bought the shares was not able to pay for them. The only thing material was that the defendant said that plaintiff was aware the bill was obtained through Hooley's fraud.

The plaintiff put his case to the bill before the jury, but did not otherwise make the money. Plaintiff had had to repay the bill, and now sued to recover the amount. Plaintiff testified to these statements.

Mr. Kelly, of the firm of J. Carling Kelly & Co., of Canada, the defendant in the action, said that he was the possessor of certain shares in a company promoted by Hooley, Bradshaw and Kelly, called the coronation mine. At the interviews before February 1903, Hooley told him he had a purchaser of 20,000 shares for £5,000, and out of that Hooley was to have a bounty of £1,000. The purchaser was introduced as Mr. Cawston, a son and partner of Mr. G. Cawston of the firm of George Cawston and Co. It subsequently transpired that the Cawston introduced was not wealthy and was not a partner in his father's firm. The transaction with regard to the mine was completed on February 26, and the bill in question then given. The bill was for £1,000 to issue bills for about £150,000 and peddle them around London. In America he should call it the "confidence game." Defendant made no use of his shares, having parted with them to Cawston. He was out of the bill, and had to pay £1,000.

In cross-examination witness said he was a business man, and what would be called money-lender in England. The transaction was introduced by Hooley, who presented the facts to him, and induced him to part with his shares to Cawston. The press made the misrepresentations were made.

After further evidence judgment for Kelly was given, Judge Darling saying fraud had been committed and Hooley should be prosecuted.

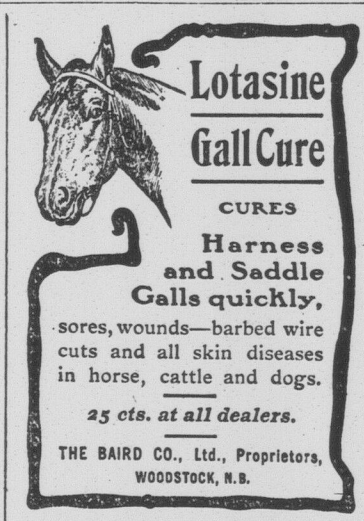
Annual Outing and Picnic of St. Mary's and St. Paul's Congregations.
