DEATH OF SENATOR O'DONOHUE.  
TORONTO, Dec. 7.—Senator O'Don-  
ohue died here tonight of Bright's  
disease. He had been in failing  
health for some time.  
Senator O'Donohue, whose death is  
announced at the age of eighty-two,  
was a native of Tuam, Galway. He  
went to Toronto in 1839 and somewhat  
late in life entered upon the study of  
law. He was at one time president of  
the Ontario Catholic League. In 1871  
he sought election to the Ontario  
legislature, and the next year was a  
candidate for Ottawa. In 1874 he was  
elected to the house of commons for  
Toronto East, but was unseated and  
defeated. Sir John Macdonald ap-  
pointed him to the senate in 1882, but  
he has been lately classed as a liberal,  
though his support was always rather  
uncertain.
