

A POINTER FOR ST. JOHN. MONTREAL, Oct. 8.— Negotiations of the Street Railway Company with the city for an extension of the for-mer's franchise with the city for fifty years came to a snag today, when the company declined to give the citizens a three cent fare and to increase the percentage of gross receipts paid to the city. The company offered to pave a portion of the streets, to re-move snow in winter and water them in suffmer, and also to sell tickets dur-ing hours of the day when the cars are most used by workingmen for ten for a quarter. In view of the value of the franchise and the length it had to run, the city demanded the three cent rate and an increase in the per-centage of gross carnings which the company has refused to grant. This probably means an end to negotiations for public opinion would not comsent to the extension without substantial concessions.
