C. P. R. steamer Lake Erie reached Liverpool this morning.

Rev. Nell McLaughlin left this morning for Fredericton where he will deliver a lecture tonight in the interest of temperance.

The tug Kitchener left Lunenburg yesterday morning with two barges in tow. These barges are to be used in connection with the dredge fielding.

Mr. Wm. McIntosh will give another talk on animals, in the series of lectures for children, in the Natural History Society's rooms, Union street, on Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

JAMES M. KELLY DIED VERY SUDDENLY

James M. Kelly, for many years a resident of St. John died this morning at his home 275 Brussels street, aged 64. Death was very sudden. Mr. Kelly was in the employ of the city, had been at work at usual yesterday and got up this morning complaining of feeling poorly. After a time he seemed to get up right and went back to bed where he was found dead a short time later. Dr. Lewin who was called, stated that death was due to heart failure.

Mr. Kelly came to St. John with the 15th Regiment in which he served. He was one of those who was sent for duty at the time of the Fenian Raids. Mr. Kelly was a native of Doagh county, Antrim, Ireland. He is survived by his wife and eight children. The latter are, five sons, James, Robert, Thomas, Albert and George and three daughters Mrs. H. Leonard, Misses Minnie and Edith, all of St. John.

The funeral takes place at 2:30 p. m. Friday, from 275 Brussels street.

### CUNNINGHAM'S TALE;

HOW MUCH IS IT WORTH?

Sentenced to Death in Russia, Tortured by the Inquisition, and Now "On De Bum"

He was wadded into the office on the breath of a brewery breeze, and with the utmost abandon dropped into a chair, carelessly remarking: "Is youse fellers all de editors?" "We was," we said, and he went on: "Does youse want to hear me tale an' see wot its good fer? I'm on de bum; wot agin' it, but here's a man, er I may call him, he was sentenced to de deat' in Russia! Dat's wot I comes fer."

"Now youse shut up"—this to his chum, who had volunteered a brief remark. "Wot does youse know? Let a real man do de talkin'—Excuse to him, he's only a laborer, not a sailor-man like meeself."

Let's see. Me name's Paddy Cunningham, eighty-eight-five P's me number in de naval reserve. I was on de Deliverment from Cardiff an' went to Odessa 'bout de time all dat nation was on, people was shooten of theirselves all over de streets. Me an' another mung 'ad de ship and got attacked on a Saturday night. We was chucked in de Jug, an' nex' day was Sunday—St. Anthony's day.

"In de on dey was a woman in de nex' cell all de time talkin' to herself, an' she said she was goin' to make a charge agin' me, she did, an' on Sunday in St. Anthony's church me an' de odder bloke was stuck two hundred on de back of de church; we was in de Deil's den, an' dey put me in an' dey had two cabinets full of electric shocks, an' dey put me in an' dey turned on de juice; nearly tore me to pieces an' I tought me days was over. Never turned so many summers in me life. Dey had one of dose Spanish Inquisition things, an' dey employed youn men an' old men, young girls an' old girls to go in an' put me in an' dey was sentenced to deat'. I was gitten about fed up on de job, but at de back of de church, dey was a little door, an' I puts an' troo de streets. All de people turns on me an' spits on me an' calls me Anti-Christ, right dere in Odessa.

"Two days more an' I was yanked in agin' and put up twenty-two days in de jail; constabul wouldn't know me, an' was goin' to sen' me away in de Adelina Paddock. I says no, but I goes to Algeria. I arrives in Algeria an' goes to work for Mr. Brown, wot has de job of coaling de ships. I explains to him as I does to youse, an' he says go back to Odessa. We can't do nothin' fer youse here. I goes to Mar-selles an' got no money, den walks 'troo France to Italy an' Genoa an' ships to New York. Den I comes here an' has been de deat' man's money."

Now we're on de bum. Dat's me story, how much is it worth. I goes to the Times in London, an' he says go to Boston to sell it to Hearse wot owns dat Chicago paper, but I comes to Boston without mon'. How much?"

### CHARGED WITH STEALING

LIQUOR FROM A CAR

James Ward Found Guilty—Case Against Thomas Cain Not Finished.

James Ward and Thomas Cain were charged in the police court this morning with stealing rum from a consignment placed in a C. P. R. car at Long Point. Both pleaded not guilty. Ward was represented by E. S. Ritchie, and Cain by Dr. A. W. Macrae, while P. S. Taylor appeared for the prosecution. Mr. Taylor asked that the men be tried separately and the case against Ward was first dealt with.

R. E. Taylor, a C. P. R. checker, gave evidence that on Sunday night, Thos. Cain and Daniel O'Neil were working in a car loaded with rum in the C. P. R. shed. Witness found one case tampered with. Four bottles had been stolen. One bottle was found in the car, hidden behind a case. Thos. Cain, Daniel O'Neil and Checker Pickett were present when the bottle was found.

Daniel O'Neil gave evidence that he was working in the car with Cain. Ward went in the car and stood near the cases, and then broke the top off one of the boxes, and took the bottles moved to his pocket. He then left the car. There was no defence given and Ward was remanded for sentence.

The case against Cain was then taken up and R. E. Taylor went on the stand and told of finding the case of rum tampered with. Cain told him that he had not touched the case.

Daniel O'Neil was called again and gave the same evidence as in the former case. Cain found his cotton book near the tampered box. The case was adjourned until this afternoon.

### THANK-OFFERING WILL

AMOUNT TO \$10,000

Generous Contributions to the Pan-Anglican Fund—Synod Committees Meet Today.

The synod committee on the Pan-Anglican thank offering met in the Church of England Institute rooms this morning. Archbishop Newnham in the chair. Reports indicated that good progress is being made in the amounts being contributed. St. Paul's, Stone Church has already raised \$1200; St. Paul's \$1200; Trinity nearly \$1000. The collections in these churches and others in St. John are not yet complete. Reports from other churches in various parts of the province indicate that upwards of \$10,000 will be placed in the hands of Bishop Richardson to be presented at the thank offering service in St. Paul's, London, on June 24th next.

A meeting was also held this morning of the committee on theological study. The executive committee of the synod will meet this afternoon.
