## AEROPLANE COLLISION NARROWLY AVERTED

Dramatic Feature of Trial Flights at Rhine

—Wrights Sue for Infringement of Patent

REHIMS, Aug. 19.—The American aviator, Glenn H. Curtiss, at Rhine, today added a dramatic feature to the trial flights of his aeroplanes entered for the purpose of availing himself of the rights of his machine above another aeroplane and averting a collision in the air, which seemed imminent.

The feat was accomplished when, for the first time in history, three biplanes, thus far, craft were manoeuvring at the same time.

All were flying rapidly when accidentally Curtiss saw M. Dumanest in an Antoinette, monoplane, approaching at right angles and on the same level with him. As quick as a flash Curtiss realised the danger and elevating his machine, it instantly shot upwards and cleared safely over the Frenchman.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Wilbur Orville Wright, the aeronaut, today entered suit in the United States Circuit Court here against the Aero-Automatic Society of this city, charging infringement of patent rights on their aeroplane inventions. The Wrights complain that the society procured from the Herri-Curtis Company and Glenn H. Curtiss, licensing machines alleged to infringe the Wrights' patents and secured Curtiss to give public exhibitions from which an admission fee was charged.

## TO WRESTLE GUTCH

Zhyzsko, Polish Marvel, After the Championship—Weights 270 Pounds.

Another European wrestling marvel is to invade the United States this year with the idea of wrestling the world's catch-as-catch-can title from Frank Gotch. He is Stanislaus Zhyzsko, known to the wrestling world as Zhyzsko, and he is due to arrive in New York from London about September 15.

Zhyzsko is 35 years old and a native of Poland. He is a representative of the highest Polish type and is well-to-do in his own name and is not dependent upon wrestling for a livelihood. He weighs 270 pounds in wrestling tops and stands 5 feet 11 inches in height.

## COFFROTH THINKS JEFFRIES AND JOHNSON WILL FIGHT

While Promoter Coffroth of Colima, Calif., believes that Jeffries and Johnson will eventually meet in the ring, he is not getting excited over the preliminary work that has been done toward matching them. When the promoter was asked the other day if he would be bidder for the bout, he said:

"I suppose that I will, but at the present there doesn't seem to be anything to do for. When a contractor bids for the construction of a house he sees the plans and specifications, doesn't he? Well, then a fight promoter ought to know what the men have agreed to. Jeffries and Johnson have agreed to nothing. I wouldn't even know to whom I would have to send a bid. Johnson has as much right to receive the bids as Berger or Jeffries. When Jeffries and Corbett decided to fight they signed articles and then called for the money. That's what this fight ought to have done."

"Do you think they will fight?" he was questioned again.

"Yes," he said, "I do."

"There is only one thing that would cause a hitch and that would be the division of the money. If Jeffries tries to take the lion's share—win, lose or draw—he may run up against it in Johnson. That colored fellow is going to demand his share or will ask that he be given an equal chance, otherwise there will be no fight."

## THIS JEFFRIES-JOHNSON BOUT

Will Jeffries on his return to this country next month, sign another two weeks vaudeville contract. In his behalf Berger recently named next April as the time for the proposed fight with Johnson, which would give Jeffries plenty of time to rake in the coin at the theatre.

## PRINCESS-AGRESS ON VISIT TO LONDON

Alfred, Through Her Husband, With the Royal Family of Russia.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—A Russian princess, who is one of the leading actresses in St. Petersburg, has just arrived in London.

She is the wife of Prince Bariatinsky, whose brother married a daughter of the late Alexander II, Emperor of Russia.

This is her first visit to England, and the main object of her mission is to study the British stage, and, if possible, open for a short season with a Russian play at one of the London theatres.

Known on the Russian stage as Mme. Yourlevsky, she has played the leading roles in many plays since 1871 in Paris, Vienna, Berlin and other large towns of Europe.

She is a tall, dark, handsome woman, with fine, large, expressive eyes. Dressed entirely in black, she made a striking figure.

## IT WAS A SURPRISE

The New York American League Club officials were surprised yesterday when they learned that the national commission had awarded the franchise to the Brooklyn club, which virtually means that he will be turned over to the Cincinnati Reds. The New York club turned Vaughtan over to the Macon Club last spring with an option on his services. The deal was closed with owner Taylor of the Boston team today by Manager Flanagan. O'Toole will stay with Brockton the remainder of the season. His debut with the Red Sox will be O'Toole's second appearance in major league work. Last season he was given a tryout in the fall with the Cincinnati Nationals and was with them until after the beginning of the big league season, when he came back to the Brockton team.

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Aug. 18.—Joe Burke and Bert O'Donnell, featherweights of this city, who have been doing well against some of the best men in their class, were matched today for a fifteen round bout before the club offering the largest purse. They will weigh in at 120 pounds ringside and each has posted a side bet of \$500.

## TOWN FOR SALE, BUT RESIDENTS OBJECT

How Tenants of Earl Fitzwilliam Would Suffer if His Wish is Carried Out.

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The population of the prosperous little borough of Highgate, numbering about 8,000, view with dismay the proposal of Earl Fitzwilliam to sell the town.

Lord Fitzwilliam's control over Highgate is more complete than mere figures indicate. His estate comprises 75 acres out of a total of 194 in the borough.

The inhabited houses on the estate's estate number 110, and the assessable value of his property is \$1,150 out of a total of \$4,400. The King, as a matter of fact, is a much larger landowner here than the Earl, but the Fitzwilliam estate is in the heart of the Highgate, where most of the people live, and where nearly all the business is done.
