### CIVIC BILLS HELD UP BY MORE RED TAPE

Must Be Sworn To Now — Delegation Will Probably Be Heard at Fredericton Next Week

A new regulation regarding civic bills which are to be presented to the local legislature has been causing the officials some extra trouble during the last few days. Formerly a certificate of their having passed the Common Council was all that was required, but now a sworn affidavit is required and in consequence some of the bills which have already been sent to Fredericton have been held up until the regulation can be complied with. The telephone bill recently drafted was forwarded to the capital today.

The day for hearing the civic delegation in support of their bills has not yet been fixed, but will probably be arranged for some time next week, when several of the aldermen will take the trip to Fredericton.

### LADIES ORCHESTRA WILL BE A FREE FEATURE

Exhibition Association Has Closed With the Famous Bostonians for the Dominion Fair

An amusement feature which should prove a strong drawing card for the Dominion Fair has been secured by the Exhibition Association. Arrangements have been made to have the Bostonia Ladies' Orchestra here for the whole time the big fair is in progress. They will give two performances each day on the bandstand in the main exhibition building. This will not be a money making enterprise, but will be a free entertainment for the visitors to the exhibition.

The orchestra, which is composed of twenty-five members, has a splendid reputation as a most efficient and artistic musical organization. They were heard in St. John a couple of years ago and made an excellent impression here.

### TWENTY FIVE HUNDRED PASSENGERS COMING

Steamers Now at Sea Bound for St. John Are Bringing Large Numbers

The C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain and Allan liner Hesperian are bringing together over two thousand passengers. Both steamers left Liverpool on Wednesday and will reach port the latter part of this week. The Dominion liner Athenia is bringing 400 passengers from London.

The Empress of Britain has 1,441 passengers on board, which is a record for the C. P. R. steamer. There are 104 saloon, second cabin and 831 steerage on the steamer. The Hesperian is making her last trip to St. John for the season. She has 600 passengers on board.

There was no report today from the Allan liner Pomoranian from London via Havre. The steamer should reach port on Wednesday or Thursday.

C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple will sail on the afternoon tide tomorrow.

### BROKEN CABLE CUT OFF 'PHONE COMMUNICATION

A break in a telephone cable left West St. John and a large portion of the North End cut off from the central part of the city this morning. Considerable difficulty was experienced in locating the break and men were at work all morning on the line. The source of trouble was found about noon and repairs were completed by about one o'clock.
