PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION JUDGMENT IN TELEPHONE CASE

Rates for Extension Sets to be Reduced 50 per cent, but Commission Found that Other Rates, Tolls and Charges are Not Excessive—No Further Advance in Rates Will be Permitted.

The public utilities commission submitted its judgment in the case against the New Brunswick Telephone Company yesterday afternoon, ordering that the rates for extension sets for both offices and residences be reduced 50 per cent, but finding that the other rates, tolls and charges contained in the schedule complained of were not excessive, and that the company was not entitled to a further advance in its rates.

The chairman stated that the ruling in the case of St. John but that in the opinion of the commission it should apply to the whole province, and that if complaints were made from other places their decision would be the same.

Mr. Barnhill then stated that the company would accede to the ruling at once and that the rates on the extension sets all through the province would be reduced in accordance with the decision affecting St. John. In reply another question of Mr. Barnhill it was said the commission had no power to assess for the costs of the case.

The changes to which the 50 per cent reduction apply are as follows: Extension set, \$10; extension set, desk, \$12; special extension set with bell for residence only, \$5; special extension set with bell for residence only, \$7.

The three members of the commission who heard the case, Mr. J. B. Baxter, Mr. Barnhill and Mr. H. P. Robinson, City Engineer and others, Commissioner G. O. Dickson City read the finding of the board, which covered 20 typewritten pages, and gave an exhaustive review of the evidence and arguments submitted.

After citing the particulars contained in the complaint of the applicants, and referring to the answer of the respondents denying the allegations of the complaints, the commissioners drew a distinction between public utility corporations and merely mercantile or manufacturing corporations. "The primary object," says the judgment, "which the legislature has in view in incorporating a public utility, is the service of the public."

That is the principal end and aim. An incident, a very necessary incident, is that the shareholders should earn a fair and reasonable dividend, but this after all is incidental to the principal object.

the payment of a reasonable dividend on the amount of capital stock actually paid for. It might be argued that the rates should be raised, but we conclude that that is unnecessary.

The company is not only well equipped, but is not earning up to its capacity, that is to say, that with its present plant and distribution it could earn a much larger revenue, and probably in the ordinary course there will be a steady increase in the company's income without a corresponding increase in its expense account.

The Extension Rate.

"There is, however, one of the charges made by the company which we think ought to be reduced, and that is the annual charge of \$12 for what is known as the extension set or desk telephone. We are of opinion that this charge is unjust and unreasonable. There is no reasonable relation at all between the cost of the service and the charge, and we therefore decide that the annual charge for such an extension set, whether wall or desk, be reduced by 50 per cent. We do not follow the argument that the extension sets are somewhat of a luxury, and to its subscribers who want extension sets for their personal convenience should pay well for them. It is the company's business to furnish a reasonable rate; the question of the luxury is not a factor. The rate charged must bear some reasonable proportion to the cost of the service rendered."

In reply to Mr. Barnhill the commissioners stated that this reduction would apply to the \$5 extension sets for residences as well, making the charge \$2.50.
