Gagetown, June 20.—The preliminary hearing of the case of Charles Medley McIntyre, the negro charged with the murder of Gabe Sabatis, an Indian, whom he struck over the head with a stlek, was concluded here in the magistrate's court, this evening and McIntyre was sent up for trial before the Supreme Court on the second Tuesday of October.

The hearing was begun at 2 o'clock this afternoon and the court house was thronged. The prisoner was brought into the court by Sheriff Williams and was represented by P. A. Guthrie, of Fredericton. John R. Dunn appeared for the Crown.

Eight witnesses were subpoenaed, but, after hearing the evidence of Charles McIntyre, fatherial-law of the prisoner, the court decided that it was unnecessary to take the depositions of the other witnesses and according the counsel for both sides agreed.
