It was confidently asserted the other day that the Bonapartists had joined the monarchists, but it was not hinted that the price of their adhesion to the monarchists was the election of MacMahon, one of the favorite Marshalls of Napoleon the Third.

It remains to be seen how long these factions can work together and support the new President. Their majority is small, the Opposition is united and determined, and the country districts are showing a disposition to hasten the time for its establishment.

Parliament adjourned, Friday, until August 13th, after a session of eleven weeks. The members did considerable work (so do members of both Houses) and made \$2400 each out of the treasury as extra pay.
