Dear Sir: The question of sewage disposal is one that has heretofore taxed the ability of men both practical and scientific for economical solution. Drainary, filtering beds appear to be the only process introduced up to the present time that answers the purpose at all satisfactory in a general way.

The principle upon which a filtering bed works is that the surface be of porous earth composed mostly of sand or gravel either combined or separate as the case may be, so that fluids may pass readily between the interstices leaving any solids which they may contain while passing through the soil and thus become purified.

We are told by experts that four

We are told by experts that four feet deep if proper soil through which effluents may pass is sufficient to guarantee the reasonable purity of the liquid which may flow out through tiles properly placed at the bottom of the filtering bed.

The difficulty with the old Berlin sewer farm was that the surface of the beds was composed of a kind of earth which when used as a filtering
