MOUNT ALLISON PLAYERS SCORE BIG HIT

"The Romantic Age" Was Well Portrayed to Large Audiences—Much Praise for the Mount Allison Players.

Mount Allison College Players lived up to their reputation last evening in the presentation of "The Romantic Age," A. A. Milne's delightful three act comedy. The attendance at the Prince Edward was large and the gathering was representative.

The Mount Allison Orchestra rendered some very popular pieces as an overture after which the curtain ascended on what was destined to be one of the nicest plays ever seen here.

The story was beautifully romantic and carried a vast amount of appeal. The action, suggestion and stage department was perfect and far above the type usually seen in amateur productions. To Miss Ida M. Leslie, B. L., under whose direction the performance was staged, must go a great deal of credit. The play was absolutely perfect in its presentation and the performance which would credit to any professional company; indeed it is doubtful if any but a first class company could give such a splendid show.

Miss Laura Welton in the role of Melisande Knowles, with her charming appearance and beautiful diction, made the character a living being. The role was emotional and romantic and the performance by Miss Welton was one of the big hits of the evening.

Miss Lucille Hodgson as Jane, Master of fact and adhering to the principals of the 20th century, made a charming contrast to Melisande. Miss Hodgson displayed great talent and her acting was clever.

Miss Ella Rogers had a very amusing and trying part in that of Mrs. Knowles, and her acting was very fine. Her portrayal of the role was all that could be desired.

Mr. Albert W. Trueman as "Prince Charming" Gervase Mallory, was at one time intensely romantic and later on a typical modern dandy. His beautiful solos were rendered by him during the show. Mr. Trueman made a fine impression on the audience.

Mr. Ernest N. Huestis as "Bobby" displayed great histrionic ability and his work was greatly admired. He will undoubtedly make a great hit in future Mount A. productions.

Mr. G. Wilson McLellan in the part of Mr. Sinclair dispensed many beautiful truisms in a splendid manner. His singing of his songs and marriage was nicely portrayed.

Mr. Lawson Scovil as Henry Knowles was a medical father to perfection. At no time was he out of place and his witticisms captured the hearty applause of the audience.

David McLeod as "Ernie" was very clever. The part was small, so was Mr. McLeod, but the action was big and his impressions were very fine.

Mr. Trueman rendered two exceptionally fine violin solos between the second and third acts. His playing of the program—vocal solo by Miss Olive Rankin, was not delivered to the great regret of the audience.

The lighting effects and stage settings were especially good and tended to increase the interest in the play. The success which greeted Mount Allison Players every night, is a credit to their understanding of their future appearances is undoubted.
