Lightship at Halifax Harbor. Notice is hereby given that an IRON LIGHT-SHIP will be placed by the Government of Canada off the entrance to Halifax Harbour, and the Lights

LATITUDE 44° 24′ 20″ N. LONGITUDE 63° 27′ 30″ W.

The Lightship is a two-masted vessel, painted red with the word "Halivax" painted in white let-letters on both sides. A red bail is placed at each mast head. The vessel is moored in 45 fathoms water. Sambro Light bearing N.W. & W. 4.3-5 miles, Chebucto Head Light N. W. 5.17 miles, Devil Island Light N. by E.7.8E. 10 miles, and Portuguese Buoy N.7.8E. 8 miles.

A Fixed white Dioptric Light is shown from each mast at an elevation of 31 feet from the water line, mast at an elevation of 31 feet from the water line, and 27 feet from the deck of the vessel. The Lights are situated 39 feet apart and in clear weather will are situated 39 feet apart and in clear weather will probably be seen at a distance of 12 miles.

The Lightship is for the purpose of guiding vessels into Halifax Harbor. It is calculated that on vessels approaching from the Westward, by steering for the Lights on an E. by N. 1/2 N. bearing they will pass 3 1/2 miles outside the S. W. Breakers; and from the Lightship a course N. 2 E. will lead a mile from Chebucto Head, and mid channel between the Litchfield and Neverfail Shoals, and in a fairway up the Harbor.

Steam Fog Alarm. A Steam Fog Whistle has been placed on board and will be sounded during thick weather, fogs and snow storms for 12 second in each minute, leaving an interval of 48 seconds between each blast. In an interval of 48 seconds between each blast. In calm weather or with the wind the whistle will probably be heard at a distance of from 10 to 15 miles and in stormy weather or against the wind at from 3 to 6 miles.
