

ENGLISH CORRESPONDENCE.

The retirement of E. Mill, Esq., M. P.—School Board and resolutions in London.—The Tichborne trial, and sundry news items.

Ma. Editor.—Mr. Mill, M. P., for Bradford, has intimated his intention of retiring from the responsibility and care of Parliamentary life at the dissolution of the House of Commons.

In London and many of the large provincial towns the school Boards are becoming re-elected. The Act of 1870 limits their duration to three years, and the whole question of their value and efficiency is being widely discussed.

Many of the prominent men of the leading Boards are not seeking re-election, but there is no lack of aspirants for the honor of a place in the Educational parliaments of our cities and towns.

Meantime the public opinion is much divided upon the whole question of Boards, or no Boards, and in many important centers where they have not yet been ordered, strenuous efforts are being made, by the erection of new schools by voluntary effort, and the enlargement of existing schools, to avert the infliction of a school rate.

The valuable course of Lectures to Young men, under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association in London, have been dropped for some considerable time, to the great regret of the multitudes who thronged to hear them.
