Sir:

Referring to your letter 17th instant, I have the honor to state that if the Provincial Game Warden does not receive acknowledgement of receipt of Game Laws sent to Indian Agents, the fault may in part be his own: No covering, or other letter accompany these pamphlets; thus, unless the wrapper is preserved, the Indian Agent will be at a loss to know to whom acknowledgement is due.

When the Game Warden states that he is of the opinion that Indian Agents do not take the trouble to inform Indians of the Game Laws, it is charitable to believe that this opinion is expressed in his haste.

As very few Indians know how to read, and have a very vague idea of dates, it is not easy to make them understand the Game Regulations. However, the principal *game* in this Agency, the coast deer, is, according to common report, greatly on the increase; this is attributable to the destruction of wolves.

A copy of Game Regulations, received by last mail is enclosed herewith; it will be seen ~~8888~~ to contain no reference to Indians.
