SUGGESTIONS FOR JANUARY.—See that no loose boards around your barn let in cold winds to chill the poor animals in their stalls. Feed regularly, and in quantity sufficient to keep stock thriving. A little grain and roots given to sheep every day will be repaid generously when they come to market. Take advantage of any mild weather and cut surface drains from low pieces of land, and thus aid in getting them ready to work early in spring. Keep tools under cover; clean and paint them. The forcing-beds and green-houses will, of course, require particular attention; and the active man may find something to do in preparing for a more genial season. Poles and rods for beans and peas may be ready to be used when needed; manure collected; compost-heaps formed; fruit-trees pruned; hedges clipped, and asparagus-beds top-dressed, preparatory to being dug when frost has ceased.

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
