### UNITED STATES.

Mr Cobb, a meinter for Georgia, and , Democrat, has been elected Speaken of the House of Representatives.

The President's Message was communicated ented to Congress on the 24th ult. The following is an outline of the document, recened by telegraph, and published to the Botton Atlas of Tuesday :

The President commences by congratules. ing the country that we are at peace with all nations, that we have been greatly bleesed by Providence, and that the scourge of choles has been staved .

The relations with Great Britain are of friendly character; the recent alteration of the navigation laws, which are reciprocated by us, are likely to prove mutually advant-

A slight interruption of the diplomatic relations with France has been terminated Our Minister has been received, and one agpointed to this government.

The President altudes to the fitting out of German War Stenmers at New-York, and intimates that by the documents referring to this procedure, accompanying the Messige, it would be seen that the parties interest approved of the course of the government No such government as the German Empire had been established, and our Minister bed been recalled, after being instructed to trace fer the archives of the Legation at Franklen to the American legation at Berlin.

The suppression of the expedition against Cuba, and the demand for the restitution of Rey, [the New Orleans man,] are slightly alluded to. The President announces that, although the crime charged against the maposed abductor of Ray is justly odious, there is no law punishing such an offence.

The Executive studiously avoided interference during the conflict between Autria and Hungary. It stood prepared, however, in case of success on the part of the Hungarians, to welcome them among the family of nations, and invested an agent with power to recognise their independence, should circumstances justify it.

Our claims upon Portugal have been pres sed with renewed vigour. During the late Revolution at Rome, our

Charge had been unable to present his les ters of credence.

The President recommends a cultivation of friendly relations with Mexico, and a faithful chservance of the treaties with that gevernment. He sends in a correspondence relating to the Protocol, and alludes to messures for settling the boundary, and adjusment of the American claims.

He recommends close relations of friend ship with the South American States, bedering on the Pacific.

A Convention has been negotiated with Brazil, troviding for the settlement of American claim.

The President calls attention to the exist ing laws concerning the African trade, with a view to the more effectual and faithful escution of the same.

Seeing that there was no prospect of remion among the five States comprising Central America, he had treated with them seperately by treaties of commerce, &c.

A contract had been made with the government of Nicaragua, by a company, composed of Americans, for the purpose of constructing a ship-canal. He had directed nog stiations for a treaty with Nicaregua, pledgage both governments to protect those who shall engage in the work. Niceragua had invited other nations to enter into the same treaty sii ulation .

The Pres dent thinks the canal may be made the bond of peace, and also thinks that the Isthmus ank Tehnantepec are worthy of consideration and though Mexico did not concede the right of the latter to us, yet be will not renew the proposition to purchaseit,

as it ought to be open to all nations. The President calls attention to the post tion of the Sandwich Islands, and desires that they may maintain their independence, and thinks that other nations should concur in this, as no government can be indifferent to their passing under the dominion of any

other power. Treasury Estimates .- The receipts into the Treasury for the fiscal year ending the 30 h June, are \$48,000,000 ; Treasury notes funded, \$10,000,000, "making \$58,000,000." Expenditure, \$46,000 000. He siys the Treasurer's report will probably show a defictency in July next of \$5,000,000, and on the 1-t of July, 1951, of \$10,000,000-make no aggregate of \$15,600,000, caused by the extraordinary expenses of the Mexican war

He recommends that authority be given to borrow the necessary amount to meet the deficiency.

The Tariff-The President recommends & revision of the existing Tariff, on a basis which may augment the sevenue. He does not doubt the right of Congress to encourage demestic industry, and thinks that specific

The President speaks well of the Navy ; sed is fivourable to a reduction of postage, except by set steamers. He alludes to forexcept by sometimes, indulges in general refi-ctions thegeupon, and above all, recommends a leve of union to every American heart. The second treaty, annexing the Island of Tigre, it is said, is withheld, and will in all probability be repudiated by Mr. Clayton, ull Mr. Bulwer, the new English Monster, shall explain Chatfi ld's insolent conduct .-The first treaty will not probably be confirmed until some similar explination is made.
