work has been done cleaning up the premises and in construction. At times this summer nearly as many as two hundred men have found employment there. At present about one hundred and forty men are on the payroll of the Chemical Products, Limited, in Trenton. The expenditure of the thousands of dollars each month has helped Trenton considerably during an unsettled period in the town's history.  
It is understood that as soon as certain details are decided upon that the contract will be let for the large building for the fertilizer plant. Other smaller buildings will be built by the company without letting contracts.  
Until such time as the new work is started, no additional men will be put to work immediately, but later on as the other work starts, some of those who have been temporarily laid off (because the particular job that they were on was finished) will be taken on again, but, it is evident that it is the intention of the company to run things on a strictly business basis, and more carefully than was the case with some of the work at the British Chemical Plant, for one reason there is not the same need for it being rushed. Eventually, the establishment will be a large one and will employ a large number of workmen.  
At an early date the Sulphuric Acid Plant, upon which work is nearly completed, will be in operation, and soon the company will also be making aspirin.  
A. H. C. Heltman, the general manager, has been fortunate in securing competent men to supervise the several branches of the work that has been going on. J. C. Adam, who was connected with the construction work at the British Chemical Plant from the beginning, has had charge of the brick and furnace work. W. H. Goodwin is master mechanic. He too, was at the old plant.  
M. A. Grace, the seed expert, who was with the British Chemical Plant from the beginning, is with the new company. B. Hawkins, the machinist, is assistant master mechanic. T. Barrow, is the electrician. S. Russell, who was with the British Chemical, is also under Mr. Heltman, who is building an organization on a sure foundation.
