MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

The May monthly meeting of the Town Council (the first meeting of the new Council) was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday evening, May 4. There were present: The Mayor, G. K. Greenlaw, and Aldermen Finigan, Gardner, Hibbard, Keay, Lowery, McFarlane and Shaw.

The Mayor submitted a communication from R. W. Grimmer Esq., M. L. A., Fred. Erickson, (under date of April 27, 1915), advising that the Chief Commissioner of Public Works had consented to allow St. Andrews two hundred dollars towards building a retaining wall at the shore on Indian Point.

A communication from R. E. Armstrong, Esq., Mayor, acknowledging receipt of Resolution of sympathy from the Council in connection with the death of his son, Donald, was received and filed.

After some discussion of the present Street lighting system, the Light Committee was requested to investigate conditions with a view to having a better service.

Mr. H. Russell, on behalf of the Knights of Pythias, was heard with reference to having the Indian Point Park made available, at an early date, for recreation purposes for the townspeople and any excursion parties that might visit the Town.
