Tench's Rink Captured Harris Bowling Trophy

And the Heather Club Has Won Silverware Three Times—Consolation Prize—Score by Ends of Interesting Matches Yesterday.

The fourth annual Brant County Lawn Bowling tournament was continued yesterday afternoon and evening. The semi-finals and finals for the Harris trophy were played. Play was also continued for the Telephone City Trophy and the play for the President's consolation prize was continued. In the semi-finals for the Harris Trophy three Heather rinks, skipped by T. L. Wood, E. C. Tench and Frank Read and a Paris rink entered by R. Inksater and skipper R. Thomson, played. Tench defeated Wood 15-11, and Inksater defeated Read 20-10.

Heathers Win Trophy.
After the Heathers had held the trophy for two years, the Pastimes won it last year, a rink skipped by Bert Ingils turning the trick. It remained yesterday for Tench's rink, composed of H. B. Beckett, J. S. Howie and J. W. Robertson to win the trophy for the Scotchmen, and they did it, defeating Inksater's rink (Paris), composed of L. A. Lapierre, C. Barker and R. Thomson 20-10, after a very stiff argument.

The semi-finals and finals were played on the Brantford Club green. Sitting on the verandah and along the ends of the green were scores of bowlers, watching the match. The trophy is now the permanent property of the Heather Club.

The Match by Ends.

Fifth End—La Pierre drew close shot with second bowl. Howie drew shot with second bowl. Inksater trailed the Jack with first bowl to other Paris bowls, drawing in with his second. Thomson placed two guards, Tench playing a runner with last bowl, going through, leaving Paris six.

Sixth End—La Pierre drew shot with second bowl. Barker drew another shot for Paris. Robertson drew second shot. Tench played a runner with last bowl which did not make any change, leaving Paris one shot.

Seventh End—La Pierre drew shot with second bowl. Howie drew shot. Robertson drew another for Heather with last bowl. Thomson was a little over weight, resting on Heather bowl and getting second shot. At the conclusion of the end Heathers were one shot.

Eighth End—This was the poorest end played up until that stage of the match, the leads and second men being short. Thomson turned Paris bowl for shot with last bowl.

Ninth End—Beckett with first bowl got a toucher trailing the Jack about a foot. His bowl rested just behind the jack. Beckett made a beautiful draw with his second bowl, resting just in front of the jack.
