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MAY MODIFY TAX ON MOVIE FILMS

Customs Likely to be Made Lighter and Small Excise Imposed Instead

Ottawa, May 7.—The Customs tax of five cents per foot on moving picture films, as announced in the Budget speech, is likely to be readjusted so as to bear a little less heavily on the film exchanges which import them for distribution among the film users. A new resolution, of which Hon. A. K. Maclean has given notice, provides for an excise tax of fifteen cents per day on each moving picture film for each day upon which such film is used. This tax will have to be paid by the users, namely the moving picture show proprietors. The Customs duty of five cents per foot, which is equivalent to about sixty per cent, and valorem, fell only on the direct importers, and the exchange people have made representations that they should not be made to bear the whole burden of this new and comparatively heavy taxation. It is probable that the Customs duty will be reduced a little. At the same time the imposition of a small excise tax will make up for this in so far as the total revenue from the taxes on films is concerned. The object in view is to equalize as far as possible the burden of the new taxation, taking part from the hand-ling of films and part from the users.

need all his bluntness to avoid being cracked on the wheel of destiny. He has had his chance and has proved himself unfit for the work in hand. But nobody can rejoice who considers the alternative that the prospect offers."

The Radical Daily News, which is opposed to the Premier rejoices that the government will not accept the Asquith motion, but will treat it as a vote of censure so that parliament on Thursday must take a decision involving the life of the government.

The Daily News adds: "The course of the government in months past has created in the public mind a condition of disquiet and distrust which is a menace to the country."

"Dispose of Mare's Nest." General Maurice is attacked by the Daily Express, which hopes and believes that the government will dispose of this latest mare's nest in such an unmistakable manner that the unrestricted warfare which lately has been an unending feature of political life will disappear."

The Times editorially urges the government to stand firmly on their proposal of a judicial inquiry into the statements of General Maurice. While not attacking the ministers, the paper says:

"General Maurice's challenge is one which the government can afford to ignore or merely rebut. Unless and until it is disproved, it will profoundly shake public confidence in every statement of the government and revive those mischievous controversies of last winter which were the greatest stumbling block in our preparations for the German offensive."

The matter in question, The Times adds, cannot be settled by an ex-carte statement, however apparently convincing from the premier.

"The premier may have an unanswerable case against the charges of General Maurice," it continues, "but the inevitable restrictions in a speech on military disposition, in a growing public distrust of all official statements, whether by Generals or ministers, and the premier's own incurable habit of protesting too much, makes it hopeless to expect any end to this controversy except through an entirely disinterested inquiry."

DEMOLISH FORTIFICATIONS.

Stockholm, May 8.—Sweden, Germany and Finland, it is announced officially, have decided to negotiate a treaty regarding a demolition of the fortification on the Åland islands. The fortifications, the announcement says, were constructed during the war contrary to international conventions.

KAISER RETURNS.

Berne, Switzerland, May 8.—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press)—Emperor William has returned to Potsdam owing to the political crisis resulting from the rejection of suffrage reform by the Prussian Diet. Count von Hertling, the Imperial Chancellor, has been summoned to Potsdam to report on the situation.
