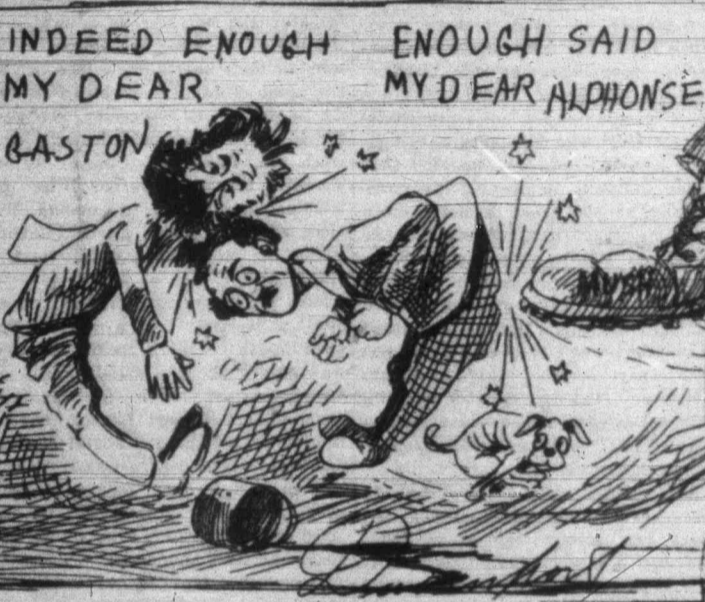

Strange Wager

Wichita, Kan., Oct. 18.—A young Englishman jumped from the top of a Santa Fe freight car while crossing the Salt Fork bridge near Ponca City, Oklahoma, saying the momentum would carry him to the bank, making a small bet to that effect. He fell short, however, struck a rock in the river and was instantly killed. In his pockets were found evidences that he was a nephew of the Earl of Londale and that he had served in the British army in India. Women Make Demands

San Francisco, Oct. 19.—The boiler-makers of the Southern Pacific company have demanded an increase of wages. They seek an increase from 35 cents an hour to 40 cents, and time and a half for overtime on the basis of 40 cents an hour. They also want certain regulations as to the number of apprentices and the number of hours for a day's work. A committee of the men has been in session in San Francisco for several weeks. It awaits an answer from Messrs. Kruttschnitt, Agler and Small. The latter official is their immediate superior. Agler is the manager of the lines west of El Paso and Ogden. Kruttschnitt is the assistant of President Harriman and the superior of Agler. Assistant Kruttschnitt has just returned from a conference with Harriman in New York. It is said that Kruttschnitt and Harriman are disinclined to grant the increase on the ground that the Southern Pacific is paying to boiler-makers as good wages as any eastern road. The boiler-makers, machinists and other mechanics of the Union Pacific are now out on a strike against the Harriman road. The boiler-makers of the Southern Pacific wish to make common cause with their fellow-workmen of the Union Pacific. The machinists of the Southern Pacific, however, seem to have no trouble with the company and appear to be disinclined just now to take part in any fight with the other mechanics of the Southern and Union Pacific roads. The present strike has so crippled the Union Pacific that it is fifteen days behind in delivering freight in this city from the east and its overland passenger trains are from ten to twenty hours behind time every day. If the Southern Pacific becomes involved with its boiler-makers and other mechanics, as is the Union Pacific, there is no telling how severe may be the freight and passenger tie-up between this city and the east.

VOTERS OF THE FUTURE

Send Application to the Commissioner. Claim They Are Also the Future Officials of the Yukon Territory. Acting Commissioner Major Wood received a petition this morning signed by a number of those whose political influence and power may well be taken into consideration at the general election in or about the year 1920. The formal document states at the head of its large number of signatures, somewhat as follows: "We, the undersigned, the coming generation and future voters and officials of the Yukon territory, desire to call your attention to the fact that the winter is now upon us, and, such being the case water congeals at 32 degrees above zero.
