TWO HUNDRED DEAD

Before the Texas Cyclone Had
Spent its Fury.

White Citizens Doing Heroic Work for the
Colored Victims—Many Families Have
Lost Everything—A Relief Committee
Formed—The Cyclone Travelled a Man-
dred Miles, Yet Its Fatal Swath was
Only One Hundred and Fifty Yards

Denison, Texas, May 15.—The city of
Sherman was visited by the worst cy-
clone in the history of North Texas
about five o'clock this evening. The
path of the destroyer was 100 yards
wide. It struck the city at the west
end of Post Creek and swept in a
westerly direction for several blocks
and then spread and spent its force.
The track the cyclone made was some
eight, the devastation being com-
plete, and houses, trees, chimneys,
mills and mill-dams were destroyed.
The loss of life will probably reach
100, with many more bruised and
wounded. The city itself was a
ruin, and the cyclone travelled a man-
dred miles, yet its fatal swath was
only one hundred and fifty yards.

The Buluwayo Troopers Will
Be Fully Paid.

The National Council of the Women of
Canada to Help Factory Workers—
Wages Better are Needed.

Montreal, May 17.—(Special)—The
National Council of the Women of
Canada closed its sittings here yester-
day. Amongst the prominent people
present were Lady Aberdeen, Lady
Thompson, Mrs. J. W. Longley, wife
of the Attorney-General of Nova Scot-
ia; Lady Leacock and Mrs. Tru-
mond.

One important resolution adopted
was the following: "That the N.C.W.C.,
believing that the true wealth of
the community lies not in the
mind and body of its workers, com-
mending the excessive hours of
labor in factories; and again
affirming its intention to work for their
relief."

The question of medical treatment
in the remote districts of the North-
west was also discussed, and brought
out some startling instances of that
lack of treatment complained of. One
delegate reported that a young farmer
had to go 30 miles for a doctor, and
when the doctor arrived both his
mother and baby were dead.
