SQUASH BALL

The Newest Game Out—The Way to Play This Game.

Squash ball! Funny name, isn't it? Have you ever played it? Probably not, unless you are in the very swim of the swim, for the game has come into vogue only within the last few months and requires a court especially prepared for its enjoyment. Just as basketball and hockey rather too vigorous, so squash ball has been introduced for those easy going fellows who find racquets and court tennis rather too exhausting.

Although undoubtedly of English origin, I believe that we are immediately indebted to sooner or later if they have any pretensions of being up to date.

A squash ball court is nothing else than a room with smooth board floor and smooth board walls.

Mr. Hunnewell's plans are designed for a separate frame building with an outside staircase leading into a spectator's gallery. Of course the building may be made as ornate as possible, but for all purposes of the game it may be only a detached cottage, thirty-four feet by seventeen feet broad and eighteen feet high.

The exact dimensions of the court here described are 31.3 feet long, 16.3 feet wide and 17.5 feet high. The floor is marked off precisely as is one side of a single lawn tennis court. There is no net, of course, but a tell-tale line is drawn across the middle of the court, and two feet high is fixed to the entire width of the further end wall. The court line is seventeen feet from this wall.

The score is exactly as in racquets—that is, fifteen points make a game.

One man serves from the back line into the left hand court, where his opponent stands to receive the ball at whatever angle he can. He slams the ball against the front wall, avoiding the tell-tale line, of course, just as he would the net in lawn tennis. The server goes on with his service, alternating into each court until he is put out, when the other man goes in to serve.

The fun and excitement of the game, of course, lie in the remarkable number of angles that the lively ball may make before you have a chance of catching it with your racquet. Of course, the ball must be struck on the forehand, in fact, all the rules of racquets prevail, and any one who has only played lawn tennis can readily adapt themselves to squash.

The ceiling of the court should be as flat as the sides and floors, but not necessarily of such well planned and fitted boards. The light in the small detached courts is usually obtained from two rows of little side windows placed high up toward the ceiling, and one large window in the top of the back wall. All the windows should be covered with wire netting.

There is no danger of being injured by the hardness of the ball, as in racquets, so squash is admirably adapted for women. Then there is not the complicated method of scoring, as in court tennis, nor the vexatious necessity of forever chasing balls, as in lawn tennis.

Altogether squash has qualities of its own which could have proceeded from no other place but Boston, and in this introducing the game we feel certain that we are offering a perfectly pure and innocent sport, in which the stout and the lean, the old and the young, the rich and the poor may indulge with equal profit and enjoyment.

Duty of Mistress and Servant.

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ADVICE TO YOUNG SINGERS.

By Gadski, the Famous Singer.

Be natural in your pose. You will never get the best effects from your voice if you take a tense attitude while singing or if you keep your muscles strained and your nerves tense.

What the doctors call relaxation must come, and when you relax you will feel very fatigued. Whereas if you had sung as you walk or stand you would have no fatigue at all.

The voice does not flow so sweetly when the muscles of the voice are drawn tight, and the chest does not give out its best tones when you have squared your shoulders too far back.

Teach yourself how to let go of your muscles at the very first note.

You don't know what an excellent help it will always be to you, not only in singing, but in everything else. Strain, be pleasant, laugh if you can, and use your eyes.

You are not going to kill any one. You are not intent upon doing a dreadful deed, and yet I assure you, many young ladies look that way as soon as they begin to sing.

There are certain difficult cadenzas that need a certain figure and movement of the head, that even a great artist in acting will have to give, but she will make the expression on her face natural and not as if she were running at a full gallop.

No singer needs to make a face at all. A singer must open her mouth very wide, and often twist it a little at the corners, but she can learn to do this without a bad effect, and you who know the musical part of singing should learn this physical part at once.

Do not fix your eyes with a stare on nothing and keep that stare up throughout the whole song. Look at the people who are singing to, look at your music, or, if you have none, look down at the accompanist, and then at your audience, all in a natural way, as if you were talking.

Don't get excited over your high notes and the runs, because if you do you will not do them half so well and your audience will see what an effort it is for you to sing, and they will not enjoy it as much.

Behind your piano have a mirror, and whenever you practice look at yourself in the mirror and see what you are doing.

You will not like your looks when singing, and so, little by little, you will learn to smile and to nod your head and to give a meaning to your words. If you have been singing a long time and have never done this before, then try it at once and see how you look when you sing.

Don't stand as if you were waiting to be shot, with your shoulders drawn high and your hands twisted together and your arms behind your back.

Don't throw your head so far back that it gives a strained look to your throat.

Don't swell the muscles up in the neck and over the chest.

It is impossible for the concert singer to take any other attitude than the conventional one, I suppose, holding the music and looking out at the audience. But the singer in a private house or in the family circle, and, in fact, the singer in general, should be able to stand quietly and yet naturally, may take some attitude which will give her an easy pose.

For instance, she may lean her arm on the back of a chair or lay her arm across the piano and lean a little against it. These things will help her to sing easily.

If you find that you cannot sing even one song without getting a little hoarse or the throat getting tired, then you have not learned to place your voice rightly.

Go to a teacher and see to it that the tones are properly placed before you sing much. There is something wrong if you get hoarse. A properly placed voice, used naturally, should last through some very long and hard singing without showing the least sign of fatigue.

It will not take you very long to learn from a good teacher how to place the tones, and then you will be on the right track and can go on steadily by yourself. If you are not going to study for a long time.
