CLEARLY DEFINED

Progressive Principles Advocated by Mr. Fraser--A Successful Meeting at Fletcher.

Fletcher, May 12.-A Conservative mass meeting was held in the hall here on Saturday evening. The audience was large and enthusiastic. The cussed by A. B. Carscallen, B. A., J. C. Stewart and John S. Fraser, the Liberal-Conservative candidate.

Mr. Carscallen dwelt at length with Mr. Ross method of developing New Ontario. He pointed to the delay on the part of the Government in beginning the development of the country and showed the great injustice done the people of the Province in the giving of large pulp wood concessions to political friends and foreign capitalists-concessions out of which the capitalists made fortunes, while the Province derived only a paltry pittance of forty cents per cord on

pulp wood cut. Mr. Stewart discussed the educational question. (He showed the fal-lacy of making the Public school a stepping stone to the High school. He argued that as the education of nineteen out of twenty pupils began and ended in the Public school, and ended in the Public school, the curriculm of studies should be so changed that pupils might devote their time exclusively to those studies which would be of greatest practical value to them in after life. Mr. Stewart also alluded to the exhorbit and showed ant price of school books and showed that a school book monopoly was in existence in which the monopolists, certain political friends of the Government, had grown fat and wealthy

by their illgotten gains.

Mr. Fraser made the closing speech.

He discussed at length the West Elgin case and explained the perjuries Elgin case and explained the perjuries and forgeries and frauds perpetrated by officers in the employ of the Government, not one of whom was punished, while some had been deliberately rewarded for their crimes.

Mr. Fraser made clear his position with regard to the railway corporations and the telegraph and telephone companies. He p inted out that these companies had escaped in the past, and were escaping now their just share of taxation. He further pledg-ed himself, if elected, to introduce legislation compelling these companies to pay their just proportion of muni-cipal taxes and thus lighten the bur-den of taxation which the farmer has

The latter was presented by the Pope with the harp of Brian Boru, and in recognition of the gift, and also by way of complimenting his Irish subjects, Henry determined to place thenceforth on the arms of Ireland, and ween all Irish colors. upon all Irish coins, a representa-tion of the relic of Erin's most celebrated native king. Previous to that three crowns had constituted the official armorial bearings of Iroland, and they alone figured on the Irish coinage from the time of Henry VIII.
