NURSERY NOTES.

Open fires are better than stoves in a nursery, as stoves dry the atmosphere too much.

A bit of butter will stop a child's coughing when other remedies fail. Mix with a little sugar if distasteful. As a broad rule, tea ought not to be given to children. Tea is a very poor food. Cocoa is in every way more satisfactory.

When a child's teeth are overcrowded or irregular a dentist should be visited. In this matter there ought to be no delay.

Young infants should not be given Indian meal. For children over one year it is a fattening and safe food. Coarsely ground maize boiled in milk will work wonders with a puny, ill nourished child.

A good lotion for regular employment, with the view of preventing the eye troubles so common in infants, consists of boiling water containing five grains of boric acid in each ounce. It is to be used either tepid or cold.

Many housekeepers bend over a stove r sink or table that is too low for their The stove can be built up on height. bricks till it is the right height, and the table can be raised on blocks till it is convenient. The sink is a more diffi cult matter, but if it is too low for the housewife and the expense of making it higher is not to be thought of, put the dishpan on the table and wash the dishes there instead of in the sink. Do anything to avoid bending the back at an angle. A high stool should be in every kitchen, for it is possible to do much more work while sitting down than one would believe who has not tried it, says Mary Taylor Ross in the Housekeeper.

Split Pea Soup.

Soak a cupful of split peas overnight in two quarts of cold water. In the morning put the soaked peas over the fire with two quarts of water, a ham bone, if there should be one, or a piece of salt pork and a small slice of onion; cover the pan closely and let simmer four hours; rub through a sieve; return to the fire: melt two level tablespoonfuls of butter; add two level tablespoonfuls of flour; stir this into the boiling soup, stirring until thickened add a tablespoonful of sugar, salt and pepper to season and a cupful of milk or cream; serve with croutons.

Heart Cakes.

Heart cakes are made in this way: Having beaten lightly the yolks of eight eggs, add one pound of pounded almonds, half a pound of sifted sugar, two ounces of grated chocolate and a quaster of an ounce of grated or pound ed cinnamon. Stir these in briskly, and when this has been done add the whites of two of the eggs beaten to a iroth koll the pastry lightly, and after cutting into heart shapes bake in tins These cakes are still more delicious when covered with chocolate or vanilla



Salt in Poulticing.

Salt serves admirably when it is destred to apply either dry or moist heat for a considerable time. The virtue of in ordinary poultice is due to moist heat. Now, the great drawback to such a poultice is that it soon gets cold. If we place over it a bag of very hot, dry salt the poultice will retain its heat for hours provided the part be well covered. A flannel bag will sufrice. The salt should be heated on a plate placed in the oven or on a stove. More warmth will be quite useless. The heat should be too great for the hand to bear. Between the poultice and the salt bag a layer of flanner should be placed. Another way of us ing the salt bag is to let the flerce beat pass away and to apply the bag with out any poultice over a layer of flan
