Berwick's newely established light and power plant was given its initial test on Friday night last and is now in successful operation. The plant is located at Faetarydale, about five miles south-west of Berwick, and is one of the most complete and best equipped hydro-electric plants in Nova Scotia. It is equipped with a 200 h. p. twin turbine. alternating current. Water is led to the wheel by 1100 feet of pipe-line, giving a head of 72 feet.


