AGED CITIZEN MEETS SHOCKING DEATH

Allen Bradley, one of the Towns Oldest and Best Known Dies From Effects of Driving Accident

Allen Bradley, one of the oldest and best known residents of the town, died a tragic death yesterday afternoon consequent upon injuries received when he was thrown from a wagon on Friday. Mr. Bradley was driving toward Coldstream and when descending the Cross Creek hill a shaft dropped out, the horse became frightened and running away threw Mr. Bradley heavily to the road and while no bones were broken he suffered severe bruises and tremendous shock. Owing to his advanced age he could not survive the catastrophe which befell him and, as stated, he passed away yesterday at the home of his nephew, W. F. McMullin.

Mr. Bradley was born at Hartland eighty-two years ago and has lived here all his life time. He never married. For years he conducted a blacksmith and woodworking shop and has been one of the best known figures in the history of the town. He was closely identified with the installation of the town water system thirty years ago and served many years as commissioner and superintendent of the water system.
