OUR WESTERN HERITAGE

Premier Tweedie in Glowing Terms Refers to the Marked Improvement Discernable.

FORMER NEW BRUSWICKERS TO THE FORE.

Hon. L. J. Tweedie, premier of New Brunswick, accompanied by Mrs. Tweedie, Miss Louison and the premier's youngest son, were passengers on the Atlantic express to this city this morning on their return from a trip to the Pacific Coast. They are registered at the Royal Hotel and will remain there until tomorrow morning when they will continue their journey home to Chatham.

The premier is delighted with his trip. He left the province some weeks ago and during his absence has visited some of the principal cities of the west. One great pleasure which they looked forward to was the meeting with their sons, Fred M., manager of the Princess mine, at Port Royal, 100 miles from Vancouver, and Joe L., connected with the same enterprise. These two young men, like other Canadians characterized by push and energy, have been successful in the west and their many friends in this city and along the North Shore will learn with great pleasure of their rapid advancement.

The Messrs. Tweedie met their parents at Vancouver and accompanied them on their visit to the principal places of interest along the coast. From Vancouver the party went to Victoria and Seattle, and then back to Vancouver.

Maritime Boys Unite.

Speaking of Vancouver, the premier said there is a strong maritime association at that place with a membership of over 1,000.

Shortly after his arrival this society presented an address to him and gave a reception in his honor, at which there were between 100 and 500 guests present. The address was read by J. Johnson, president of the association, and the premier made a fitting reply, speaking for about half an hour.

Archdeacon Pentreath, who is well and favorably known in St. John, also delivered an address of welcome, which was a very pleasant evening was brought to a close with refreshments and a social dance.

N. B. Boys Doing Well.

"I was very glad to observe," remarked the premier, "that all the New Brunswickers whom I met were doing

remarkably well, and that a great many of them have accumulated considerable wealth. I met several St. John people, among the number being Joe Ellis, son of Senator Ellis, of this city, who is making a name for himself in the thriving city of Vancouver. I remained over at Calgary on my return and met R. P. Bennett, a former Albert Co. boy, also at one time practicing law at Chatham. He, like the others, is doing well. I also came in contact with several north shore men, all of whom are prospering.

"While at Vancouver I spoke at a liberal meeting held in the interests of the candidate, R. J. McPherson, at the People's theatre. The place was packed to the doors."

The premier predicted large gains for the liberals in the west.

Winnipeg's Progress.

"There is a marked development in Manitoba and the north west" incidentally remarked the reporter.

"There certainly is. I stayed over a time in Winnipeg and the progress of that city is surprising. In the north-west the development is most marked. Lands, which for years were lying idle, are now the scenes of thrift and enterprise. It is a grand country, with almost inconceivable possibilities. Winnipeg bids fair to become the centre of the west."

Kindness of the C. P. R.

Premier Tweedie on his recent return to the kindness and courteousness of the C. P. R. officials. They do all they can to make it as comfortable as possible for travellers over their line. He was very much pleased with the kindness he and his family had received from the officials of the C. P. R. and their subordinates. Premier Tweedie remarked that Superintendent Downie of St. John was most popular in the west. Everybody speaks in the highest terms of him.

"What do you think about the political aspect in New Brunswick?" "I hold," said the premier, "to my opinion expressed some time ago, and that is that the result of the elections in N. B. will be that 10 liberals, at least, will be elected out of the possible 15 seats."

Premier Tweedie will remain in the city tonight and proceed home tomorrow.

Conservatives Nominate Narcisse Landry in Gloucester

Hon Mr. Tarte Will Not Contest Any Seat.

Tarte Will Not Run for Commons.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—Hon. J. I. Tarte, ex-minister of public works, announces to-night that he will not run in the coming time for Commons. Until now he has been silent on the subject. In the last parliament, Mr. Tarte represented St. Mary's Montserrat division, but it was expected that this time he would offer in Berthier, his native county.

Conservatives Expect Gains in Ontario.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—Hon. John Haggart was in town today. He is very sanguine over the liberal conservative outlook in eastern Ontario. He says the party will certainly gain six seats in the east district, including North and South Renfrew, North and South Ontario, Glengarry and another seat in Ottawa.

La Presse Has Been Sold.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17. The political sensation today has been the news of the sale of La Presse. The paper to-night announces that a joint stock company has been formed with a capital of \$1,100,000. It declares that neither Rodolph Forget nor any other local capitalist will own any stock in the company, but that Mr. Berthiaume will retain the controlling interest. The capitalists will be American, Berthiaume, and J. N. Greenshields, who is now in New York making arrangements. It is also claimed that the paper will be independent in politics.

Another story had it that David Russell and J. N. Greenshields have obtained control, but this Mr. Greenshields denies in a telegram published in La Presse.

To Run in Two Constituencies.

MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—Solicitor General Lemieux has finally decided to run in Nicolet as well as Gaspé, the election in the latter constituency taking place at a later date. In Nicolet his opponent will be the late member, George Ball, and in Gaspé, Thomas A'Hearn, a Montreal newspaper man and a native of the county.
