MONTREAL, Oct. 17. The political sensation today has been the news of the sale of La Presse. The paper tonight announces that a joint stock company has been formed with a capital of \$1,100,000. It declares that neither Rodolph Forget nor any other local capitalist will own any stock in the company, but that Mr. Berthiaume will retain the controlling interest. The capitalists will be American, Berthiaume, and J. N. Greenshields, who is now in New York making arrangements. It is also claimed that the paper will be independent in politics. with the merits of the allegations set forth.

"Frank Arnoldi, of Toronto, tried to force Mr. Russell to pay an architect's account of \$4,900 that was claimed by H. H. Mott, the well-known architect of St. John, to be a heavy overcharge—while the whole matter had nothing whatever to do with the purchase of the property, as the deeds were held by the Montreal Trust & Deposit Company until today, when the final payment of \$30,000 fell due and was promptly met according to contract.

"The sum of \$2,700 which Mr. Mott had advised Mr. Russell to be a proper charge for the services rendered, was accepted by Arnold & Ewart, the architects of the Caledonia property, in full settlement of their claim. "Today David Russell's attorney's in St. John served the publishers of the Globe with a writ claiming \$25,000 damages.

"There are several interesting features in this case apart from the legal aspect. The suit is creating considerable interest in St. John, where Mr. Russell has many friends and large newspaper interests, which somewhat conflict with those of the proprietors of the Globe, one of whom, Richard O'Brien, has entered the political arena as a Liberal candidate."


