**The Second Half.**

The Dalhousie scrim kept up their good work in the second half and had U. N. B. on the defensive right at the start. McLean was hurt but after a short delay he resumed his place on the forward line. U. N. B. touched for safety early in the half and on the drop out Dalhousie made a good return. U. N. B. relieved on a long dribble, but the play was brought back to their five-yard line on equally as fine a dribble by the Dalhousie forwards. Jewett was hurt at this period of the game and had to retire, Griffiths taking his place.

Dalhousie kicked the ball over the U. N. B. line and Bender held it too long, behind the posts and was tackled, and a liveyard scrim called. On the scrim Stultz carried the ball over and Jones converted, making the score read: Dalhousie, 8; U. N. B., 6.

That was practically the turning point of the game as Dalhousie played with renewed energy thereafter. U. N. B. tried hard to get the ball down the field and finally succeeded after a series of fine dribbles by the forwards. On the "Dal" twenty-five yard line Maiman secured the ball and went about ten yards, when he passed to Murphy, who went over and U. N. B. were again in the lead with the score 9 to 8. McGibbon had a hard kick and failed to convert.

**Won in Final Four Minutes.**

It looked good to the U. N. B. supporters at this stage with only four minutes to play, but the old saying that a game is never won until the last whistle is blown proved only too true.

After a scrimmage on the fifty-yard line a Dalhousie back kicked the ball and Richmond followed up strong and blocked Otty's poor attempt at a kick. Creighton, who was coming along strong with Richmond fell on the ball as it went over the line and Dalhousie had made the deciding try of the game.

It was a hard game to lose for U. N. B., but their showing was of the best. McLeod was the bright star of the forward line, following up hard and keeping in the game all the time.

The half line had no particular star, the quartette all playing well. McFadden played his first game at quarter for this year and was as good as ever. Otty at fullback played a good tackling game, but his punting was not up to the standard. Dalhousie had a grand forward line with "Farmer" Pineo at the star, and a great quarter division with three "old heads" Fraser, Stultz and Graham using all their football strategy to win. The halves were not up to the U. N. B. backs and were outclassed.
