





Terpsichore gives a few practical in's about digestion as follows: Do not swallow milk fast and in such big gulps. Sip it slowly. Take four minutes at least to finish that glassful, and do not take more than a good teaspoenful at one sip.

When milk goes into your stomach it is instantly curdled. If you drink a large quantity a tonce, it is curdled into one big mass, on the outside of watered, and it almost seems to lose

SHEEP AND DOGS.

The question of best breed of sheep' hinges largely upon locality and purpose. If fine mutton be the special object, the downs are doubtless best, especially the Southdowns. tion, production of early lambs will probably be more profitable, and it is not always the finest mutton sheep which best fill this bill. A good-sized lamb, early in the season, will bring a big price, no matter what the breed. Years ago, I was very much interested in Cotswolds, and still think highly of them.— Their wool does not usually bring so much por pound as some others, but it will make up in quantity and deficiency in price. They are large sheep, and the lambs are marketable quite early. But of late years, a breed, the Dorset horned, is coming to the front, nearly equal to Cots wold in size, and reputed as breed-

ing twice a year. The Dorsets are said also to be courageous, and willing and able to fight dogs, using their big horns very effectively against the murderous invaders. This is certainly a great advantage to farmers who hesitate to poison dogs on their places- a thing I never hesitated about at all. A vial of strychnine is, in my essimation, worth a'l the dog laws on the books. I never could understand why sheep-raisers should hesitate to protect their farms from dogs, without ever bothering the Legislature about the matter at all. I was once very much troubled by dogs, being near a village.

I gave notice in the town papers that, after a certain date, my premises would be unhealthy for dogs. I soon had a pile of thirty dogs, and then the public realized that my place was private property, and not a hunting ground for worthless curs. Finely bred animals of the Dorset bread can probably be breed can probably be had for \$25 to \$50 each. — Louisville Home
