THAT PETITION.

The Tribune again censures the school board for its action in referring the petition of West End residents to a committee. It seems to us that that was the proper course to take in dealing with the matter and the one which is the practice of all deliberative bodies. The fact that the members of the committee had expressed themselves as opposed to granting the prayer of the petition could hardly be avoided as we understand the members of the Board without exception hold the same view.

In regard to the petition we might say that several of the persons whose names appear thereon are now sending their children to the convent school, a distance almost twice as great as it is to the high school building. And then there are others who merely signed the petition, to use their own words, "to get rid of it."

The feeling of the Board is that there should be consolidation and that it would be very unwise to open up the building referred to in the petition for school purposes, particularly when we have a comfortable, well regulated, sanitary school building in use now. This is a fact which ought not to be lost sight of. There is just a possibility of the scholars receiving more injury by attending a school where the sanitary conditions and other comforts are necessarily very poor, than they would in the walk to the high school through the clear atmosphere for which this town is noted.

LOYALTY

We do not know who wrote the following advice, but it is good at any rate and worthy of close reading and of being inwardly digested.

Every citizen should be loyal to his town, but loyalty to a town consists of more than a disposition to throw your hat in favor of everything and to try to uphold all kinds of conduct. The loyal citizen is the one who scorns the idea of giving sanction to anything having a lowering or debasing influence.

Causing, drunkenness and all kinds of debauchery are frowned down by the loyal citizen. It is his duty to aid in curtailing all immoral practices and to uphold right principles, no matter where they may happen to be found.

The man who stands up for right may get hard knocks from doers of wrong, but unflinching persistency will hold the respect of the better classes and, we believe, ultimately will win the respect of those who may profess antiquity.

The inconsistent moralist is the one who is sure to lose the confidence of everybody, and the world isn't slow to size up a man at his true value. To be loyal to a town then, is to uphold every good measure and try to make it better. He who keeps on fault finding constantly has something in himself that isn't just right and even should he make noise enough to blow off his head, his influence will extend only to those of his own calibre.

NOT A SUCCESS

The tag system for big game adopted by the legislature last session has not worked as well as was expected and it is therefore impossible to obtain a record of the number of moose and caribou killed in the province this season.

Up to the present time the tags received by Deputy Surveyor General Newelling show that 145 moose and 25 caribou have been killed, but it is safe to say that this does not represent one half of the actual number. The game season closes on November 30th.—Herald.

A RATEPAYER'S VIEWS.

Mr. Editor,

The East End is talking over the agitation worked up in the West for another school house, and saying how easy it is to fool the majority of the ratepayers, when a petition is presented to them to sign. This agitator, whoever he is, is asking the Trustees to take a long stride backward in the progress of educational matters in our town, and trying to make the readers of the Tribune believe this town is behind the times in this respect. We have a modern up-to-date, central school building, with capacity for a great many more scholars than are now attending. They are blessed with all modern conveniences, breathing pure, good air all the time they are in the building, and its sanitation is of the best; also the heating is by the best latest improved system, and yet those ratepayers, without giving the matter sufficient thought, are asking to have their children sent to an old barracks of a building, with no ventilation, that must be heated by a stove, no modern closet conveniences, but just such as you would find in the backwoods section of a country. On second thought the ratepayers won't be fooled, because a man from St. Stephen says it should be so.

Our Trustees are deserving of the highest praise for placing educational matters where we find them to-day. Is it St. Stephen, St. John or Fredericton that is leading in all the latest methods connected with education? No, it is Campbellton. Where was Manual Training that is now so popular, first introduced? It was Campbellton. And school gardening that is proving such an educator to the young, will have the first lessons imparted to New Brunswick scholars on the Campbellton school ground next year. In our end we trust the Trustees to keep education in our town up to the standard, keep down the taxes as well as you can, get the best teachers and pay them better than you are doing at the present time. It is only ten minutes' walk from Duncan's Hill to the school house, but our children have to walk half a mile further, and they seem none the worse for it. If you grant a school up there, we are entitled to a third at Slab Town.
