enticed some of them into her lair by the bait of matrimonial advertisements, and there had an active hand in killing them and disposing of their bodies is said to have been established without question. The one remaining question, that of whether she had assistance in her crimes, is to be met by the action that is expected almost hourly.

The arrival at this point has been preceded by a hunt for minutes, rumors of which have been made public. Here and there bits of evidence have leaked out, but the great array of facts, it is said, was secured from statements made by Lamphere.

The chief agent in securing the con- fidence of the prisoner has been the Rev. E. A. Schell, pastor of the First Methodist Church, who ever since the first day of the prisoner's incarceration has been a visitor at his cell.

Upon the reports of the clergyman, the investigators have built their case.

How Murders Were Done.
Laporte, Ind., May 12.—The "mining" operations, which have been promised by Sheriff Smutzer for several days start- ed in earnest to-day in the ruins of the Guinness home. Louis Schultze, who was employed by the Sheriff to shuck ashes in the cellar, completed his apparatus early and began work.

Additional evidence of regarding the methods by which the persons whose corpses were found on the Guinness farm met death was unearthed this morning. Almost two dozen pairs of scissors, bent and curved in the fashion of surgical in- struments, are said to have been found in the ashes in the cellar and in addition three knives, two of a surgical char- acter and another an unmistakable dirk.

It is believed by some that the weapon employed in the series of mur- ders, but the fact that there was no mark of penetrating wounds on Andrew Heiglein's body, is a possible refutation of this theory.

Chloroform or some other deadly drug is thought to have been used to accom- pass his death.

In all the other bodies on the farm there is no negative evidence to disprove the dirk theory, although the condition of the Cadavers precludes definite in- formation on this point. The knives and scissors are thought to have been used in dismembering the bodies.

Mrs. C. O. Lapham, of Laporte, who for six years was a neighbor of Mrs. Guinness, says that on the only occasion on which she called upon her a strong breeze coming through an open window blew aside the folds of a loose house dress which Mrs. Guinness was wearing and revealed about her body a wide belt containing pouches of various sizes and sheaths which seemed to have been con- structed for knives.

There is a possibility that the grand jury which convened here yesterday will begin consideration of the charges against Ray Lamphere to-day.
