Laporte, Ind., May 12.—The "mining" operations, which have been promised by Sheriff Smutzer for several days started in earnest to-day in the ruins of the Gunness home. Louis Schultze, who was employed by the Sheriff to sluice the ashes in the cellar, completed his apparatus early and began work.

Additional evidence of regarding the methods by which the persons whose corpses were found on the Gunness farm met death was unearthed this morning. Almost two dozen pairs of scissors, bent and curved in the fashion of surgical instruments, are said to have been found in the ashes in the cellar and in addition three knives, two of a surgical character and another an unmistakable dirk, were picked up. It is believed by some that the dirk may have been the chief weapon employed in the series of murders, but the fact that there was no mark of penetrating wounds on Andrew Helgelein's body, is a possible refutation of this theory.

May 10.—Commercial failures this week in the United States, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., are 305 against 330 last week, 308 the preceding week and 190 the corresponding week last year. Failures in Canada number 28. against 16 last week, 22 the preceding week and 20 last year. Of failures this week in the United States, 114 were in the East, 76 South, 82 West and 33 in the Pacific States, and 111 report lightlifts of \$5. TRISH UNIVERSITY BILL South, 82 west and 33 in the Facilic States, and 111 report liabilities of \$5.000 or more against 108 last week. Liabilities of commercial failures reported for April are \$20,316,468. against \$11,082,096 for the same period the previous year.
