ONTARIO.

The hay harvest around Listowel is all housed.

Diphtheria has made its appearance in Sandwich.

James Corbett, of Lansdown, was 170 swarms of locusts.

Andrew S. Keeble, for 27 years treasurer of Bradford, is dead.

The Salvation Army at St. Thomas employs a private constable to attend its meetings.

A child has been born in Ottawa with six fingers on each hand, and six toes on each foot.

A Frenchman named Arthur took the Paris green route for the hereafter on Wednesday.

A \$10,000 Sabbath school-house is being built in the rear of St. Paul's Presbyterian church at Hamilton.

The Toronto News says potato bugs are no more numerous in that vicinity than they are elsewhere.

A strawberry tallow has gained local fame by delivering a pair of pants three hours after the order was given.

The St. Catharines Journal says ordinary farm hands in that vicinity are refusing \$20 to \$30 per month for their services.
