tion is given to the contractor also to employ and supply against contractors and subcontractors. The information is to be given from time to time upon request but as a condition of the contract.

As to Fire Protection.

In regard to protection from fire A. & G. W. Alberts and Greg W. W. Railway agreement provides the company shall employ with regulations as may be determined by the board of directors.

Provisions in the C.N.R. Agreement.

The clause as to fire wages in the C.N.R. agreement is naturally a matter of some interest and is referred to the lieutenant governor in council, who has the sole right to settle what is the contract for only as to wages, but the firm teams, and also to fix the hours of work and the minimum rate of wages.

No Aliens to be Employed.

That no laborers shall be employed belonging to countries which have alien labor law excluding Canadian employment.

Proper Sanitary Conditions.

Proper sanitary conditions are enforced in construction camps and provision made for the isolation of contagious diseases, both under the provisions of the Provincial Board of Health.

Drainage of Adjacent Lands.

The drainage of adjacent lands must be provided for, and necessary. "Apart from the agreement you remember that the Alberta and Great Waterways Railway Guarantee Act and section 9 and 9 for control of the rates of this railway.

Option of Purchase.

By section 10 of the Act, the government have the option of purchasing the entire undertaking of the company at a fair value, and upon the following terms: that upon every fifty miles of the railway being completed the company are to provide accommodation for freight and passengers.

Besides all these provisions.

are applicable to this company as well as to the other companies. It will keep in mind that the company is subject to compliance with the provisions of the Provincial Board of Health.

Blow Against Night Riders.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 20.—Geo. Bell died suddenly of heart failure at his home 60 Beach Avenue today. He was 61 years of age. Bell was the well-known dog fancier and coxer spaniel judge in both Canada and the United States, having owned some of the best bred coxer spaniels in America.

He Winked at Gambling.

Havana, Feb. 21.—Col. Pifra, chief of police, has resigned owing to the dismissal of a captain, who testified at his own trial that he had merely obeyed the chief's orders to wink at gambling in a certain political club.

Successful Flight in Bi-Plane.

Berlin, Feb. 21.—A successful flight was made here Sunday in a new bi-plane, the invention of the Yacht Builder, Max Oertz. Oertz himself made the flight and he remained in the air for 45 minutes at an altitude of 450 feet, which is a record for German aeroplanes.
