Clean Up, Keep Clean and Beautify.

"O wad some pow'r the giftie gie To see oursels as ithers see us." These words of Burns were recall ed to our mind by reading the observations of the Rev. George W. Ridont on cleaning up St. John's, Mr. Ridout's article appears in another part of this issue. Mr. Ridout observes with the eyes of one who has a keen love for his native city and who rejoices in the beauty of its sur roundings, but deplores profoundly what man has made vile. He points to the growing tourist traffic, and the inference is obvious that we must be up and doing and see to the cleaning up of the city if we are to reap the full advantages which Nature has be-

stowed upon this spot. Mr. Ridout's remarks are so point ed, so much on the lines of what we have been writing about for years, so strong an endorsement of the wholesome criticism made by our correspondent "Reform," that we are publishing them in this article to give additional prominence to them. Mr. Ridout remarks:

"Why should St. John's, the Capital City, allow itself to run on year after year with dirty, ill-kept, poorly paved streets and with drains that smell at times so vile-plain language, but please excuse me. No city has a finer location for a perfect drainage and sanitation system. St John's ought to be one of the best paved, the best kept, the cleanest cities in North America, and this could be accomplished at a minimum of what it costs some other cities. It is to be regretted that the absence of cleanly, well-kept streets is a matter mon gossip among the tou who are pouring into St. John's in increasing numbers every year." He concludes with an exhortation to the Municipal Council to take a lesson from Halifax and to make a resolve that St. John's shall "clean up and keep clean and beautify."
