ST. PETERSBURG, To-Day. Mr. Stolypin, the Premier and Minister of Interior, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted by the Emperor. M. Kokovsoff, Minister of Finance in the Stolypin Cabinet, is the new Premier, whose appoint ment has been gazetted. M. Stolypin presented his resignation personally to the Emperor on account of the rejection by the Council of the Empire of the Zemstov Bill for self-government in nine of the west provinces.

A Million an Hour.

The Government printers who have secured the official contract for the supply of postage stamps for 1911 and onwards have built a new factory for the purpose near London, where they are already turning out stamps at the rate of a million an hour.
