

In his letter he expresses the fear hat we shall sacrifice too much if we allow Gloucester free bait. not see that if under present conditions Canada obtains free entry for er fish, and if under that arrangement she is able to supply the Amerian market with fish, as she will do.
it can make no great difference to us whether we give the Gloucester bankrs bait or not. All or most of the fish the American market will take will be caught on Newfoundland bait, only in that case Newfoundland will get nothing whatever in return for it. suppose when the position is put that way, that it will be replied that we shall refuse to give the Canadians any bait. But, there's the rub. tope we can. As I pointed out is a somewhat doubtful proposition

upon which to bank however, and do not forget the Canadians are themselves not entirely devoid of bait The matter of supplying bait to anadians is altogether very importnt and I may even ask leave to re-

er to it at another time Again, it is argued that we must not give Gloucester free bait because by doing we shall handicap ourselves in the U.S. market. Now "Terra No quoting your Editorial, appears ncingly I think) that because only ,000 qtls. of Newfoundland fish go Porto Rico, we shall lose very lit indeed, if we lose that market ltogether. I would therefore put this osition to "Terra Nova." If the loss of that market is not worth troubling they were always satisfactory nuch about because only 20,000 qtls. our fish go there, then, a fortiori. e matter of handicapping ourselves the American market to which, up to few months ago, we practically never hipped anything, is of no moment whatever. Besides this your corresondent states that in any case we cannot cure our fish for, or ship i o, the American market. If that is so nen why worry, as your correspondent seems to do, about letting Glouces ter have free bait, and how can w 'handicap ourselves' any more that market? The arguments, as such, do not carry much force. The fact is that in realising our nnual catch of fish, every little helps,

ing the moderate amount we ship there, Porto Rico is to-day a very important market for us. Three years ago, as every fish exporter John's knows, Porto Rico demand, competing with the Brazilian buyers who apparently had things pretty much their own way and were ing according," simply saved the situation from collapse. And at the present moment the price of Large and Medium Codfish is fully 50e. per wise be just because a few schoone loads of green fish were shipped to Gloucester during the late fall and winter. It is the small margin of excess or shortage on the normal, which within wide limits governs commercial values.
