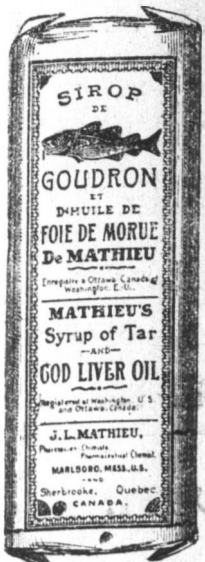

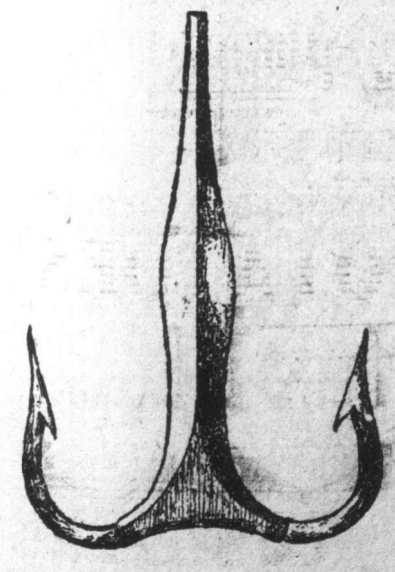

Did you know that you might have dyspepsia, sore throat, nervous prostration, asthma, epilepsy or catarrh—

of thousands of the glasses wearers—in the United States one-fifth of the population, or about 17,000,000 come under this classification—do get their glasses after a merely mechanical examination by the optician. But, then, there are thousands and hundreds of thousands of people whose sight fails before old age and who also have nervous and other troubles that may be due to this very cause.

The five or ten dollars that you spend for an examination and prescription from a first-class oculist—what is it beside the hundreds of dollars those faithful servants, the eyes, help you earn each year?

I know a man—a man of some education, too—who does not believe in either oculist or optician. He buys his glasses at the department stores. He says he can get just as good ones there. Think of it—in this supposedly enlightened age! Nor is he a rarity. Quite the contrary. He must be one of a goodly class, else why would the department stores carry costly glasses, or why would every county fair have its fakir who industriously advertises to fit you with glasses, while you wait, for a quarter?

Let me tell you about a little foreign girl whom I met when investigating the miracle of how a girl exists on the small wages that some shops and factories pay. The girl was telling me the budget of her expenses. I believe she was making something like seven dollars a week, and yet one item of that budget was \$27, for visits to the oculist and glasses in the last two years.

Think what that meant to a girl who after her necessary living expenses were paid, could not possibly have had more than \$3 a week for carriages, clothes, amusements, incidentals, and to tide her over possible illness.

And yet she knew enough to pay that sum rather than go to an optician, whose failure to fit her eyes properly might mean the jeopardizing of her whole earning power.

Evidently the wisdom of far-sighted extravagance is not monopolized by the so-called upper classes.

Fads and Fashions.

For the frocks of the bridesmaids and maids of honour there is nothing lovelier than the bordered chiffons, voiles and marquisettes.

The fashions of the French Revolution have not been heralded with much noise or protest, but nevertheless they are here in full force.

Sleeves are growing shorter and shorter. They still retain the Japanese line, although many are modified by cuffs insertions and puffings.

The high line rings out a clear and insistent note. It occurs on dresses for mourning, afternoon and evening. It is suggested on coats and wraps.

What large hats are seen have a broad brim abruptly curved across the front with feathery trimmings placed high and flowers low and flat.

Many little evening frocks are trimmed with cords of precious stones or beads to imitate them. Coral on black-and-white striped mousseline is stunning.

The feather hat trimmings are all small the Mercury wing predominating.

Wonderfully pretty hair coiffures may be made by studding a gold ribbon with turquoise or a black one with diamonds, a green with pearls or turquoise.

For afternoon wear steel is predominant. It is procurable in gowns, buttons, fringes and embroidered stripes. It is used on hats, coats, dresses and slippers.

The hanging panel at the back of the skirt is being exploited on cloth suits and on linen frocks. It is becoming, easily applied and covers the fastening of the skirt.

Many of the Eton jackets have large revers. They are either the supple, folded satin shapes or the straight flat ones. They can be of contrasting color, embroidered and beaded.

Softest satin is now used for all petticoats. It is a fad of the season to have the petticoat for a street suit match the shade of the lining of the coat. Colored linings rather than white are fashionable.

Except in tailored costumes, one scarcely ever sees a single skirt. Nearly every one hangs over a second one which is, in turn, often split to reveal still another skirt simulated by a panel of lace, silk or embroidery.

Cluny, Irish, Venice or the heavier laces are used on hats and can form brims, crowns or entire shapes. Generally the white or cream laces are used, but dyed laces are making themselves a place in the modiste scheme.

Sir,—Parts of the letter of your correspondent "Terra Nova" seem to call for some reply from me.

In his letter he expresses the fear that we shall sacrifice too much if we allow Gloucester free bait. Does he mean that if under present conditions Canada obtains free entry for her fish, and if under that arrangement she is able to supply the American market with fish, as she will do, it can make no great difference to us whether we give the Gloucester bankers bait or not. All or most of the fish the American market will take will be caught on Newfoundland bait.

Again, it is argued that we must get nothing whatever in return for it. I suppose when the position is put that way, that it will be replied that we shall refuse to give the Canadian any bait. But, there's the rub.

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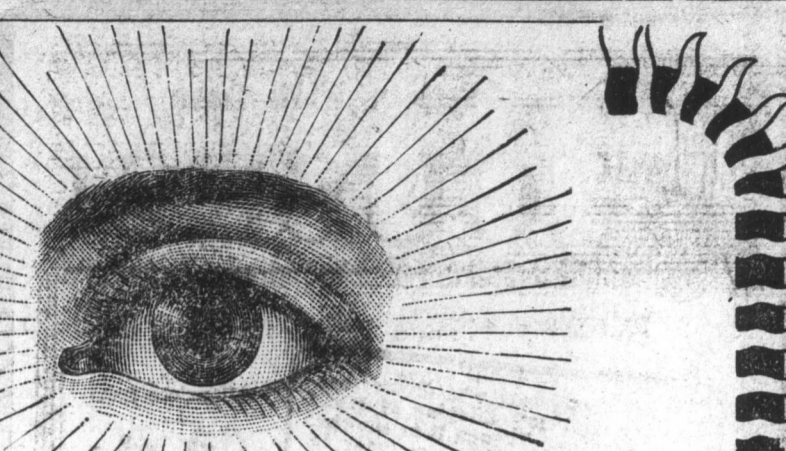
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Are Your Eyes Weak?

How you may know when Glasses should first be used and those in use abandoned:

- 1st—If you are obliged to move small objects further from the eye in order to see distinctly.
- 2nd—If you find it necessary to place the light between the eyes and the object.
- 3rd—If, when considering a near object, it appears to have a kind of mist before it.
- 4th—If the letters of a book run together, or seem blurred or double.
- 5th—If the eyes are fatigued by close exercise, and you are obliged to relieve them by rubbing or closing them.
- 6th—If black spots appear before the eyes or seem floating around them.

If you observe any of the above signs of distress, it indicates that the "accommodating muscles" of the eyes are no longer able to alter the shape of the lens so as to focus rays of light coming from different distances. A contest with failing sight is hopeless and properly fitted glasses will relieve you.
