A Proverb Reversed.

Old folks should be seen and not heard. How's that for a twentieth century reading of an old proverb? Don't you think it's nearer the feeling of the age than the old version? It came to me the other day when I watched a man of sixty-five or seventy sitting isolated and alone in a crowd of young people. One of them, the hostess, was his daughter, the rest were the young people of the neighborhood. They were nice young people and they were not rude to him—far from it. They were all civil and courteous, and yet—well, he was unmistakably out of it.

Apart Instead of A Part.

The life eddied and swirled about him, the sallies of wit, the references to other good times flew back and forth across his head; he was not a part of it. Now and then someone spoke to him, evidently making a conscientious effort to do so, but for the most part he sat in silence, neither speaking nor spoken to.

As I watched him and saw how little he resented his isolation, with what pathetically telltale patience and accustomedness he acquiesced in it, I felt a surge of indignation pity, not only for him but for all the older folks who sit quiet and apart in homes all over the country. And not only against this group of careless, happy young people but against you and me and all the other young and middle aged folk all over the world who create such isolations.

ing, the daughter of the house (generally considered a sweet and thoughtful girl) offered to show me a book of snapshots. Her father was in the room and when she came back with the pictures he peered over her shoulder pathetically interested. "I never saw those before," he said. "Old people should be seen and not heard."

Are you impressing that upon the hearts of the older people whose lives touch yours, by failing to share your interests with them, by answering them sharply when they ask some question that betrays the slowness of the older mind or the different point of view of the older generation, and by letting them feel out of it when you have your good times?

The total number of volunteers enrolled to date is 1,781, the following having enlisted with the Reserve Force yesterday:

There are now 185 men, fully equipped, on drill and No. 4 Platoon is in course of formation. The volunteers are now undergoing a special course in what is known as muscle firing exercises, which practically means loading and firing with the minimum loss of time. This branch of work is under the direction of Lieut. Nunn who took a special course in musketry while on the other side, and who is assisted by Instructor J. O'Grady.

The work of inoculating the men against typhoid has begun and yesterday 25 men were inoculated. The work will be continued until the whole company has been treated.


