WAR NEWS.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

FROM BERLIN.

BERLIN, Dec. 22. The Overseas Agency says that the ologne Gazette published a despatch from Athens stating that nearly all the British troops have left Imbros, Lemnos and Tenedos Islands, to be sent to Salonika. Troops on Imbros Island were most discontented, some of the troops mutinied, and five or six officers of the general staff are reported to have been killed. Finally the troops were removed after they had been promised that numerous re-inforcements would be sent.

GERMAN OFFENSIVE FAILED.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22. A Herald despatch from London says the correspondent of the Daily Express telegraphs from Geneva that the German offensive on the Riga-Dvinsk front has completely failed. Von Hindengerg has been forced to retire before Russian counter-attacks after burying his cannon and aban doning enormous amounts of material The Germans unable to cross the Dvinsk, have suffered very heavily. Five German divisions have retreated on Tukum against which the Russian are advancing. A sanguinary battle is in progress near Uxkull.

CONDITIONS IN GERMANY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22. Miss Helen Keller and other per ons in the United States are obtaining uncensored news from the capi tals of belligerent nations in news-papers published for the blind in don, Paris, Berlin and Vienna. According to Miss Keller, these newspapers are not censored because they are printed in shorthand Braile type, used for the blind which the censors are unable to read. Through the medium of these journals what is probably the most authoritative article on Germany's lack of food has reached this country for the first ime. It is revealed that every man woman and child in Germany is living on slender rations, doled out by weight determined on after a conferce of chemists, scientists and physicians in Berlin. These uncensored counts of conditions in warring countries tell me the true sentiment ong the working people and the intolerable conditions that surround them, said Miss Keller; their hearts are almost at the breaking point.
