## Prospero Back.

REPORTS MILD WINTER NORTH-  
HERRING FISHERY AN UNDE-  
CEBATED SUCCESS IN GREEN  
BAY—PARTICULARS OF FISH T

TRINITY.  
The S. S. Prospero, Capt. A. Kinn,  
returned from Griquet and inter-  
viewing northern ports yesterday after-  
noon. Going north a severe snow  
storm was encountered a week ago  
and the ship was forced to shelter at  
Baie Verte for a day and night. That  
was the only rough weather experi-  
enced on the trip. On the whole, the  
winter north has been little else but  
Shore there being little slob ice met  
but nothing to impede the heavy work  
of the ship. She brought a full freight  
and a number of passengers.  
During the last few days when the  
ship was coming south the weather  
was intensely cold, the thermometer  
being down below zero on Sunday  
last.

The herring fishery in Green Bay  
for last fall and this winter has been  
the best in the history of the country,  
said our informant. Since the be-  
ginning of the year the herring  
have been in abundance all over  
the Bay and of an unusually large  
size and daily the fishermen have  
their "hands full" attending to their  
nets. Most of the herring caught re-  
being packed under the Scotch cap  
because from \$7 to \$10 per barrel is  
being paid by American and Canadian  
agents throughout Green Bay for per-  
ring cured by this process, whereas  
very much less is offered for herring
