## Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**GERMANS BEATEN BACK.**  
LONDON, Sept. 21. The Germans launched heavy counter attacks last night on British positions south of the Ancre on the Somme front, the war office announced this afternoon. New Zealanders, defending the attacked positions, beat back the Germans with severe losses to them.

**CANADIAN LOSSES ON THE SOMME.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 21. The military department is informed that Canadian losses on the Somme number about four hundred killed, 1,200 wounded, and 300 missing. There are no official details.

**FRENCH BOMB HUN POSITIONS.**  
PARIS, Sept. 21. On the Somme front the French energetically bombarded German positions Thursday, according to official communications issued by the War Office to-night. Only intermittent bombardment occurred on the remainder of the front.

**CONNAUGHT FAREWELLS.**  
KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 21. The Duke of Connaught paid a farewell visit to Barlefeld Camp to-day and inspected all the battalions. "This is my last inspection before leaving for England," he said to the men in khaki. "I hope I will meet you all over in France."

**CRETE REVOLUTION.**  
PARIS, Sept. 21. Revolution in the Greek island of Crete is reported in a despatch from Athens. The revolutionists are said to have proclaimed a Provisional Government.  
London.—The people of Crete are reported by the Athens correspondent of the Central News to have overthrown the authorities and disowned King Constantine. They are said to have decided to send a committee of revolutionists to Salonika.

**GENERAL LABOR STRIKE.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The threatened general labor strike in sympathy with the striking street car men will be called to-morrow. This was announced late to-day by Ernest Boehm, Secretary of the Central Federation Union.

**WEALTHY MERCHANT DEAD.**  
BOSTON, Sept. 21. Gaspare Di Cola, a wealthy importer and wholesale fruit dealer died to-day as a result of wounds inflicted by an unknown man who shot him five times near his home in Brooklyn, last night.

**CONSCRIPTION FOR AUSTRALIA.**  
NEW-YORK, Sept. 21. A News Agency despatch from Melbourne published the fact that it is considered certain the conscription plebiscite bill will pass the Senate. Women's votes probably will decide whether the conscription measure, strongly advocated by Premier Hughes, will be approved by a referendum general; the belief is that it will. Thousands of women with relatives already at the front are certain to vote in approval of the motion. Conscription by Australia is the result of a strenuous campaign by Premier Hughes, an advocate of compulsory military service throughout the British Dominions.

**BRITISH INVENTIONS.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The British are manufacturing new inventions which would turn Krupp's green with envy, according to Benjamin Rand, of Harvard University, who returned from a visit to England to-day on the steamer Andania. Accorded privileges of inspection by the British Foreign Office Dr. Rand said he visited munition and ordnance factories, and saw some astounding inventions, but that he was pledged not to disclose their nature. He found among every class, he said, an intense determination to do all possible to win the war. In one factory he saw 7,000 women at work, uniformed in khaki. New factories were being built, he said, and existing ones constantly extended.

**AN ATTEMPT ON VENIZELOS.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 21. The Journal has the following from Rome to-day: "Despatches received to-day from Salonika say that the German military attacks at Athens organized a conspiracy to assassinate former Premier Venizelos, and that an attempt to end the life of the pro-ally statesman was actually made. Friends of the former Premier succeeded in frustrating the plot. Advice from Salonika say that King Constantine's Palace at Tatol is now protected."

## Gives Up His Leg.

One of the most remarkable surgical operations on record is now being performed at the Grand Palais, Paris.

The massive building usually used for the annual exhibition, has now been transformed into a vast hospital. Here two soldiers lie side by side, bound together like Siamese twins, while a large portion of the leg of one of them is being slowly transferred into the leg of the other one. Noted surgeons are gathered about, watching the slow development, which they regard as marvellous both from the surgical standpoint as well as from the sentimental, in which one soldier is calmly giving day by day part of his body to a fellow soldier.

The two men lie on their backs on a large operating table in one of the halls of the hospital. They lie in opposite directions, the head of one near the feet of the other, like the figures on playing cards. They are among the most seriously wounded of the younger class of soldiers, one 28 and the other 23 years old. The younger, Roussiot, was wounded in the leg at the battle of Morhange in the early days of the war. He was taken prisoner to Germany, where the surgeons say he did not receive intelligent attention. Brought back here it was necessary to perform a second operation to lengthen his leg 14 centimetres (about 5 1/2 inches). But after the operation was performed, there was still a lack of bony matter between the two portions of the broken femur.

The other soldier, Tillet, an artilleryman, was seriously wounded in the leg in the desperate fighting over Fort Douaumont. In a field operation his leg was amputated above the knee. Later it was found that a second operation was necessary in order to shorten the leg by some centimetres. It was at this point that the surgeons concluded that the soldier who needed the longer leg, Tillet, was consulted by the chief surgeon, the operation of grafting was fully explained to him and it was made known also that he was rendering a service to a soldier comrade and to science. He did not hesitate, but gave his full consent.

Thereupon the operation began, and now, after some weeks, the two soldiers lie there on their backs, the right thigh of Roussiot against the left thigh of Tillet, bound together with the same surgical bandage so as to prevent the slightest shifting of the operated parts until the phenomena of transferring one leg to the other is accomplished.
