GALLANTRY OF 46TH DIVISION.

GALLANTRY OF 46TH DIVISION.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY ON THE ST. QUENTIN SECTOR, Oct. 3. (by the A.P.)—Among the English divisions which have made deep gains in this sector in the recent fighting is the 46th, commanded by a Major General who was a private in the South African War. It was this division which first crossed the Hindenburg Line at the St. Quentin Canal, north of Belleglise, last Sunday. The entire division attacked from a point two thousand yards west of the Canal, virtually annihilated all the Germans holding the first Hindenburg Line there, then being unable to see twenty feet because of the dense fog, these soldiers followed the examples of their barrage to the Canal binks, where under the leadership of a Brigadier General, already the winner of the Victoria Cross, they plunged into the water. The opposite bank was lined with German machine guns. Some of the British wore life belts removed for the occasion from the "leave" boats plying between England and France, while others plunged boldly in and swam across through a perfect hail of bullets. 

TRIBUTE FROM HIS COLLEAGUES. TRIBUTE FROM HIS COLLEAGUES.

The passing of Edwin J. MacGregor leaves a vacancy in the General Post Office that it will be difficult to fill. His work will be continued, but none will ever devote to it greater zeal or more efficient service. His was a position of trust, which called for fidelity as well as ability. That he was an able man none will question, and his fidelity is proven by his honourable record. In all his long years of service not even one mistake was recorded against him. As an official he won the gratitude and approval of all with whom or for whom he worked, his colleagues and the publicalike. But it is in another form that the blow falls most heavily. Edwin MacGregor was one of those rare men who inspired affection as well as esteem. He was a gentle man, quiet, modest and sincere, an example to all with whom he came in contact, one with whom he came in contact, one to whom life meant more than the faithful execution of duty, much though that may have counted. It is said of him that none ever heard him utter an unkind word or knew him to do an ungenerous action. Many teach and preach the Golden Rule-Edwin MacGregor lived it.
