A Bad Blunder.

Commenting upon the belated Ad of the Audacious in 1914, the Westminister Gazette recalls that that was the earliest serious naval loss Britain cealment of the fact was a bad blunter a policy of keeping strict faith with the public had been adopted. The announcement this morning states that "the sinking was kept secret at the urgent request of the Commander-in-Chief. Grand Fleet. and the Press loyally refrained from giving it any publicity." The testimony to the loyalty of the Press is deserved, but we say as journalists that the Press kept silent against its own judgment. The fact of the sinking could not be kept secret. Long terday from Channel with a cargo of accounts of it were published in the American papers, which reached Germany, and as a fact the Audacious was included in a German list of vessels sunk, while our own people were supposed to know nothing of what happened." The story was widely circulated in Canada also, and thousands saw the New York Herald's picture of the sinking ship.

German Bluff.

The German "bluff" was kept up almost to the end. Day by day 'ne German papers were boasting of the strengthening of the German regist ance and the unshaken moral of the German troops. Thus the "Frankfurter Zeitung" declared that the moral of the German troops was the decisive factor in the situation, and that with trifling exceptions it was as exalted as ever. Only a few days before the signing of the armisice the German wireless, reproduced Lunatics at Large with special headlines in all the German papers, declared that the German lines had been further shortened and strengthened, and that on the whole Foch's great blow of November 1st signified a fresh success for Ger man arms and German leadership. 
