"He Is Risen."

"Hail! Festal Day to Endless Ages known;
When Christ o'er death victorious gained His Throne."

THE Birth of our Lord was heralded with celestial splendour and magnificence, fit proclamation for Him who was to be King of Kings, when the portals of high Heaven were thrown wide and through them issued the angelic choir, which amidst supernatural radiance, announced in joyous melody the nativity of the Son of God. To those who witnessed the wondrous phenomena, the revelation of the manifestations of the Omnipotent Creator in the giving of His only Son to mankind, there was something awesome and strange, and it is not to be wondered at that the leader of the heavenly chorus adjured the people who both saw and heard to "Fear Not." The Messiah was born on earth, while squadrons of the hosts of heaven wheeled and circled in the ethereal spaces, and the evangel was sounded within the hearing of the then known world. The glad tidings were made known to all mankind, amid scenes never before dreamed of by humanity, and wise and simple hastened to do homage and worship at the manger of Bethlehem. The news of the birth of a Saviour was brought to earth at night and many were apprised of it.

But how different was the announcement of the Resurrection. Made by an angel to two lone women who had early in the morning come to the tomb to seek their loved Master's body, and bear it away, to be embalmed with spices, "He is not here, He is Risen." A simple statement of a marvellous fact. "He is not here. He is Risen." Thus was the fact of the resurrection and the redemption stated. Seven words told of the most sublime, the most important, the most tremendous, the most transcendent, the most epochal occurrence in the history of the universe. Christ had risen from the dead as He said He would. But there were no celestial demonstrations here: there were no witnesses to the great event. Two forlorn women were made the first custodians of the triumph of their Lord over the grave. "He is not here. He is risen." Nothing could be more plain? Theologians may twist and turn it how they desire, but the mighty fact remains undeniable. The accomplishment was real. Nothing can detract from the direct utterance of the tomb's celestial guard, and with sublime faith the women, "Mary Magdalene and that other Mary" went their way sorrowing in that they had not seen their Lord, but with hearts elated because of the marvel of the thing that had come to pass. Their stupendous secret could not be kept for long. Others were waiting to share in it, and they had been enjoined to communicate it to Peter and the Disciples, with the promise that afterwards they all should see their Lord. They had no doubt. Their faith was great. He had risen as He said.

From Bethlehem to Calvary: from the Manger to the Cross: from Death to the Resurrection, triumphing over the grave and winning for man immortality. Upon these events are built the whole structure of the Christian Faith. Inexplicable scientifically, the Resurrection of Christ is nevertheless of one piece, and quite in harmony with the altogether unique and extraordinary life of our Lord. Its omission from the fabric of the Christian Faith would leave the world "with an example of unparalleled fortitude in the face of terrible trial, with a splendid vindication of the supremacy of truth and righteousness, but with no power, no living Christ, no Intercessor, no atonement for sin, no authority to carry on in His Name, no certitude of commission, no assurance of His presence and no Holy Ghost." With the Resurrection an accomplished fact, with Christ victorious over death and triumphing over the grave, we possess all these, and in their possession we can hold fast to the faith once delivered to the Saints. Easter is for all a season—the season—pregnant with the power of our Lord. All the solemnity of Lent has departed. The darkness hanging over the land from the ninth hour on Good Friday was dispelled by the dawn of Easter, when unseen by the gaze of mankind, Christ, by the Almighty strength with which He was endowed, rose from the dead to die no more. Death's dominion over Him had ended, and He had become "the first fruits of them that slept." With the clouds of doubt dispersed, Christians put off their sadness and on Easter Day greet their risen Lord, and each heart.

"Is now a fane where love can find
Christ everywhere embalmed and shrined."

The General Currie.

Although no definite announcement has been made, it is understood that the Nova Scotia Steamship Company will place the steamer General Currie, 2300 gross tons, on the Boston-Halifax and St. John's, Nfld., service about the 15th April. The General Currie is much larger than the Lady of Gaspe or the Brighton, which the Company had on the service last year, and would no doubt be a large cargo carrier.

The General Currie is practically a new ship, being built by the Dominion Shipbuilding Company at Toronto last year. She registers 1400 tons. Her dimensions are: Length, 251.1 ft.; beam, 43.6 ft.; depth, 21.5 ft.—Halifax Chronicle.
