"Hail! Festal Day to Endless Ages known; When Christ c'er death victorious gained His Throne."

HE Birth of our Lord was heralded with celestial splendour and magnificence, fit proclamation for Him who was to be King of Kings, when the portals of high Heaven were thrown wide and through them issued the angelic choir, which amidst supernatural radiance, announced in joyous melody the nativity of the Son of God. Nothing can detract from the direct utterance of the tomb's celestial guard, and with sublime faith the women, "Mary Magdalene and that other Mary" went their way sorrowing in that they had not seen their Lord, but with hearts attacked. The presence of a policeman elated because of the marvel of the thing that had come to pass. Their stupendous secret could not be kept for long. Others were waiting to share in it, and they had been enjoined to communicate it to Peter and the Disciples, with the promise that afterwards they all should see their Lord. They had no doubt. Their faith was great. He had risen as He said.
