WASHINGTON, May 3. The text of the United States reply to obtain the money what were the parations. This move, therefore, again expressed its earnest desire for a prompt settlement of this vital question, and strongly urges the German Government at once to make directly to the Allied Governments, clear, definite and adequate proposals which would in all respects meet its just obligation.

DOWN TO BEDROCK.

LONDON, May 2. The Supreme Council to-day reach ed a substantial agreement on the terms to be imposed on Germany. In the principle of this agreement Germany is under obligation to pay the Allies six billion six hundred million pounds sterling. She will be required to pay one hundred million pounds yearly, plus twenty-five per cent. on her exports, and this obligation on the part of Germany shall be acknowledged by an issue of German bonds bearing five per cent. interest. Of these a certain amount shall be issued she has the ability to pay. These terms will be incorporated in the ultinatum, which expires May 12, and which will be sent to Germany as soon as details are definitely decided on.
