A QUESTION ANSWERED.

In the issue of *Telegram*, dated September 22nd, there was reprinted a letter, written by one James L. Faunce to the Philadelphia Public Ledger, appealing for old clothing to be sent to the naked people of Newfoundland. In a short introduction to that letter we asked the question, "Who is James L. Faunce?" Until a few days ago we were altogether at sea touching the identity of this Philadelphia philanthropist. Then our question was answered, and by no less a personage than the redoubtable James L. Faunce himself. On his letter head is printed, "James L. Faunce, Dry Goods, 900 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia," so that our friend Mr. Faunce is in trade. His opening plaint is that nobody knows him in St. John's. That, of course, is the misfortune of this city not its fault, for we are positive that if Mr. Faunce ever does St. John's the honor to visit us, the whole population will turn out en masse to give him a welcome such as becomes his efforts to render aid and assistance to our nude and half starved inhabitants of the North West Coast, even though only by donations of worn out clothing. Mr. Faunce naively says that he has been for many years on the West Coast, and believes that he knows more about conditions in out-of-the-way places on that coast than any editor possesses from a like source of knowledge. Well! well! Mr. Faunce's name like that of another celebrated personage could not have been noised abroad throughout the coast, which he has for so long visited, otherwise we should have heard of him and his charitable activities long ere this. But such is fame. As the poet says, "A fancied life in other's breath." If Mr. Faunce were more explicit, and would give the names of the localities in which he so magnanimously dispensed charity, we could ascertain the extent of his ministrations. That he left on the island more than \$20,000 we could quite believe, for that would be average around \$1000 per year. But did not Mr. Faunce take away the equivalent of that sum in some shape? He did not visit Newfoundland to interest himself in the anthology of the island, nor yet to study the manners and customs of its people. He came because it suited him to come, and thereupon he commences to pose as the benefactor of the West Coast. Mr. Faunce's letter in full, which we publish elsewhere to-day, tells its own story, or at least his own story. We leave it to our readers to be the judges. We are neither obliged nor grateful to Mr. Faunce for his letter published in the Philadelphia Public Ledger. One of these who does not hide his candle under a bushel. The hospitality of this country has been extended to many adventurers, who have exploited it to their own advantage, and to the disadvantage of our people. Too much of this charitable solicitation has been going on, in the United States. Perhaps if Mr. Faunce's eyes were directed toward Philadelphia he would discover many worse cases of want in that city of brotherly love

than exist in Newfoundland. Let him practice the "Charity begins at home" virtue. The people of this country are heartily sick of being held up as fit subjects for cast off garments, as starving, as suffering from all sorts of incurable diseases, as ignorant, as inept, by men who drift into the island, and remain but for a short period. It is high time for this practice to cease. We are neither better nor worse than the people of other countries, though not quite so numerous in indigence as some of these. We are not asking charity from anybody, nor do we crave the kind of left handed advertisement given us by Mr. Faunce. Without wishing to boast, we might tell Mr. Faunce that we have been in more places in Newfoundland and Labrador, big and small, out of the way and near, than Mr. Faunce can ever hope to, should he continue to come to this country for more years than he says he has, and we have never yet seen anything similar to the conditions which he alleges to have witnessed.

Oporto Market Report.

MUTTON, AND PORK CHEAPER THAN FISH.
The following report under date of September 29 is taken from a letter received by the Board of Trade from Paria, Pimenta & Coimbra, fish importers of Oporto:
"Our exchange has gone steadily from bad to worse. At the moment the escudo is quoted on London at 2 pence or 120 to the pound sterling. Under these circumstances an advance of \$3 per cent. on a cargo corresponds to 244 escudos, or \$30 in Portuguese money, and this is already an excessively high price. So far we are seeing that natural prices have not accompanied the progressive fall in the value of the escudo, owing to the fact that our codfish market here has been very dull in sales, customers and consumers being reluctant to pay the high price already asked. However this should change for the better as soon as various stocks bought on a more favorable exchange, and still existing in various warehouses, come to an end and prices are more uniform. Nevertheless the excessively high price now asked for a kilo of codfish puts this article more and more out of the reach of the poorer classes here, and this makes its sale far more difficult. Our ventures this year have already begun and this generally causes sales for the provinces of Minho and Douro to be very heavy. Last year and this year, however, these sales fell considerably as our fishermen finding the price of cod too high, gave their workers pork and mutton, as these articles were cheaper."

Chinaman Reported.

WAS HELD ON BURGLARY CHARGE.
Tee Ming, the Chinaman who has been under arrest on a charge of breaking and entering an office in the Royal Bank building, has been deported, and left by the Silvia to-day for China. He will not be allowed to delay at any place en route longer than the time necessary to make connections. The decision of the Justice Department to deport Tee Ming was strengthened by the fact that although found in McCarter and Clayton's office, no stolen goods were found in his possession.

WELCOME GENERAL ELECTION.

LONDON, Oct. 21.
All political parties welcome the prospect of an immediate general election, which, it is recognized, could not have been delayed in any case. The Conservative Party meeting for the election of Bonar Law, will be on Monday afternoon at the Hotel Cecil. This is to be followed by an announcement of the dissolution of Parliament either Monday night or Tuesday. Expectation is general that polling will take place on November 16th.

FIVE DROWNED.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Oct. 21.
Three men and two women passengers were drowned, when the river steamer Dream capsized and sunk in the St. John River, near the mouth of Bellisle. Those lost were below decks and unable to get out. All the crew and two passengers were saved. The cause is unknown. The Dream was a former steam yacht, belonging to Senator W. H. Thorne, but was purchased five years ago by the Ocoee Steamship Company, as a river and passenger steamer.

ALL READY FOR START.

CLONESTER, Oct. 21.
Light airs from the Westward prevailed this morning, an hour before the race came. The Bluenose was not damaged by grounding on a mud bank, and all is in readiness to meet the Ford, which is having finishing touches applied to sails. Secretary of the Navy Denny is sailing on the Ford, and George W. Kite M.P., represents Canada's Government on the Bluenose.
